Montreal Wins Pennant In International League

 Montreal Royals won their first pennant in a decade of operations in the International Baseball League in Montreal last night as they defeated Rochester Red Wings under the atom-bombing of a seven-run attack capped by Red Durrett's run homer over the right field scoreboard 293 feet from the plate in the eighth inning.

It was a drama-filled inning that saw the Royals cram those seven runs and eight hits into the crucial stanza to win on the final out.

Royals had 13 hits all told and there was some tight clotting in their portion in addition to the hitting of Durrett. Jean Pierre Roy in holding the Red Wings to seven hits raked up his 25th victory of the season which was a first boom coming at this time.

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y. Sept. 5 (AP)—New members of the Baseball Hall of Fame henceforth will be elected every year instead of every three years, it was announced today by the committee. The change was made because of disappointment arising from the failure of the Baseball Writers' Association to name anyone to the hall last January. The writers' choice is confined to the ranks of players active in the period subsequent to 1900.

LONDON, Sept. 5 (CP)—Transportation difficulties have forced postponement until next spring of the International Lawn Tennis Federation conference which was to have discussed resumption of Davis Cup play, a British Lawn Tennis Association official said today.

Cubs Tighten Grip On Top Of National League

 Effective pitching by Ray Prim and Claude Passou backed up by a 20-hit attack enabled the Cubs to tighten their hold on the National League lead yesterday with a double victory over New York Giants 5-2 and 10-2, before 25,769 fans in Chicago.

Prim, a 39-year-old left-hander, allowed five hits in the 5-2 opener, in recording his 11th triumph, were singles except Ernie Lombardi's 19th homer with one man on in the fifth frame.

Five boots by New York in the second fray helped Chicago roll up 10 runs on 10 hits off four pitchers, including a homer by Andy Patko in the eighth.

They pulled the opener out of the hat 10-7 with a five run ninth-inning flare-up featuring an awesome assortment of long-distance home runs for the entertainment of 51,511 customers. But in the nightcap their bats were full of holes and they bowed 5-1 before the stylish southpawing of Joe Page who served up a fancy three-hitter in his first route-going performance this year.

All of this five-hour fuss left the recently red-hot Yanks thoroughly chilled. 5 1/2 games off the pace after dropping two of three starts so far played in their current seven-game series.

Any horse winning the first two heats in any race shall relinquish his pole position and assume last scoring position in the race.
 All purses divided 40-30-18-12 per cent. Entry fee 5 per cent.
 No deductions from money winners. Six horses to enter—four to start.
