Annual Meeting
Saint Charles Auxiliary Society

The annual meeting of the St. Charles Auxiliary Society of the Charlottetown Hospital was held on January 4, with Excellency Bishop Roy presiding. The minutes of the last monthly and annual meeting were read and approved. The president then gave her report on the year's work. The financial statement was read by the treasurer, Reverend Mother Paula, who also gave a brief history of the St. Charles Auxiliary Society since its establishment. On November 15, 1879, the ladies of Charlottetown formed an auxiliary for the newly founded Charlottetown Hospital. In 1880 this society was reorganized, and the members chose as their patron, St. Charles Borromeo, the great sixteenth century saint who was the patron saint of the Bishop, James Charles MacDonald. In the seventy years of its existence the members of St. Charles Auxiliary have raised over \$100,000.00 for the Charlottetown Hospital. They have run the gamut of money making ventures. Nothing is too great, nothing too small, if it would aid their beloved institution. The same spirit which animated the first members of the society, has been passed on to the present band of zealous workers, who have done and are doing so much for the Charlottetown Hospital.

During the year 1944 - \$2,994.15 was raised in various ways. Expenses were \$2,924.20 of which \$800.00 was donated towards the furnishing of a DeLuxe Room in the new pavilion. Funds were also put aside for silver, etc., for the patients' trays. The report being finished the officers of the past year then vacated their seats and an election of officers for the present year was called. The president, Mrs. J. J. Duffy, was re-elected by acclamation and after much persuasion consented to accept the office for another year. The vice-president, Mrs. Michael Conway and the secretary, Miss Margaret Wisner, were also re-elected by acclamation and it was with deep regret that the members acceded to their wishes and accepted their resignations. Mrs. Stephen Trainor was then elected vice-president and Mrs. J. A. Mullin, secretary. To the executive committee were appointed Mrs. John Coady, Mrs. John Pollard, Mrs. McCarron, Mrs. Joseph Bradley, Mrs. Patrick Murnaghan, Mrs. John Sweeney and Miss Margaret Wisner. The sick and visiting committee is as follows, Mrs. Walter Currie, Mrs. Emerie Holland, Mrs. Peter LeClair, and Mrs. Emil Gallant. His Excellency congratulated the members on their splendid work, wished them success in the year to come, and spoke entertainingly of his visit to hospitals while abroad. An interesting report of the general meeting of the Maritime Hospital Aids Association, of which Miss Margaret Wisner is zone chairman for Prince Edward Island, was read by Reverend Mother Paula. It was decided by the members to hold a cake sale and the Annual Easter Play. At the conclusion of the meeting a dainty lunch was served by the Sisters, and a social half hour enjoyed by all the members.

January Meeting
Charlottetown Ministerial Assoc.

The January meeting of the Association was held on Tuesday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. building with the president, Rev. M.D. Dunbar, in the chair and conducting the opening worship. The secretary, Rev. J.D. Davison read the Minutes and the Correspondence. The treasurer, Rev. T.H.B. Scriver gave a financial report on the offerings received at the service of the recently observed Week of Prayer and, on his motion, gifts were voted to the World's Evangelical Alliance, of London, England; the Canadian Council of Churches, of Toronto; the P.E.I. Protestant Orphanage and the P.E.I. Hospital. In addition, the offering received on the Wednesday evening was turned over to the Charlottetown Branch of the Bible Society. Arrangements were made for the holding of religious services at the following institutions weekly or semi-monthly: Beach Grove, Sanatorium, Falconwood, Infirmary, Orphanage and the Jail. The guest and special speaker for the day was the Rev. L.G. Marshall, Maritime secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, who led a very profitable and interesting discussion on all phases of Sunday observance. The next meeting of the Association is to be held in the Y.M.C.A. on Tuesday, February 7th, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Meeting of Business
And Professional Women's Club

A program on Canada was featured at the January meeting of the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club held at the Charlottetown Hotel on January 9. The program, arranged by teacher-members of the Club, was introduced by Helen Yeo, and enthusiastically received by the audience. The program began with Canadian songs in which everyone joined. Helen Ramsay gave a paper on Canadian cultural development, presenting the achievements of the C.B.C. particularly in the drama as something for Canadians to be proud of. Interesting and out-of-the-way items about Canadian geography and history were presented by Mona Clay, Bessie Prowse and Ethel Taylor. Gertrude Love gave a talk on Canada's seventeenth National Parks, and two films, "This is Canada" and "The Circle in International Park" rounded out the program. During the business meeting the treasurer reported that there are 52 paid-up members, and the convener of the Ways and Means committee, Mrs. Chris Pickard asked for suggestions of projects and activities for the Club, receiving many ideas which will be presented for discussion at a later meeting.

Views Of Premiers
At Ottawa Conference

OTTAWA, Jan. 11—Following are the views of about ten Maritime provincial Premiers voiced at the opening of the Dominion-Provincial Conference on constitutional amendments: Premier Campbell of Manitoba—Any method of amending the constitution on matters of Dominion-Provincial interest should contain provision for obtaining the consent of the people of Canada. That consent might be expressed either by the people themselves or by elected representatives. Guidance in determining the form of consent, and the matters on which it would be considered necessary, might be derived from a study of precedents in other federated countries. Manitoba agreed that the doctrine of consent should be incorporated as a cardinal principle in any new method for amendment in matters affecting both federal and provincial governments. Premier Douglas of Saskatchewan—The Saskatchewan Government felt a Dominion-Provincial conference on social security and economic problems should have preceded the constitutional conference. The government should state whether at a proposed general Dominion-Provincial conference in the fall it will revive the social security, public investment and other proposals made at a 1945-46 conference. There should be provision for a temporary delegation of powers. This would enable a provision to hand over temporarily authority to the Federal Government, and also enable the Federal Government to delegate some of its powers. The Federal Government should be given control over labor and marketing legislation. Premier Manning of Alberta—There is need for a redrafting of the Canadian constitution. The responsibilities between the provinces and the federal authority. If the redrafting was decided upon, the B.N.A. Act and certain other statutes could serve as the basis of a new constitution. Alberta feels the question of constitutional-amendment procedure is part of the broader question of constitutional rights and powers. Premier Johnson of British Columbia—Method for amending the constitution should be sought by going slowly and doing it in stages. Prolonged and careful study will be necessary before a satisfactory system is found. The present conference should seek a basis for discussion and then turn it over to those who are competently equipped to deal technically with constitutional matters. Those experts could "take this framework and build on it so that at a later date we may return for a further conference to determine whether agreement can be reached. Premier Duplessis of Quebec—The province of Quebec "is completely in favor of a Canadian constitution decided upon in Canada by Canadians, amendable if proper methods can be found and we are willing to co-operate in finding those methods of amending by Canadians and for the benefit of Canada. "We are in favor of a Canadian tribunal having the power to decide in Canada all legal difficulties that may arise in Canada." Premier Frost of Ontario—Ontario felt that the constitution should not have been altered in "piece-meal" fashion through legislation passed at the last session of parliament. The abolition of appeals to the judicial committee of the Privy Council in London and the obtaining of power to amend the constitution on matters within federal jurisdiction could have serious effects on the provinces. The province would have "felt better" if the conference had been asked to deal with the whole question instead of having it done piece-meal. However, the Ontario delegation would consider any suggestions of other governments and was prepared to advance some proposals of its own. VANCOUVER BIRTHS SAFEST IN WORLD
VANCOUVER, Jan. 12 - (AP) - Vancouver still is the safest city of its size in which to be born, according to statistics released by the city's chief medical health officer, Stewart Murray. The figures show Vancouver's infant mortality last year was 24.9 per 1,000 live births, a slight increase over the city's 1948 world record of 24.3. Maternal mortality per 1,000 live births was down from 1.4 in 1948 to only .97 for the first 10 months of 1949. At the same time the city's birth rate has dropped from 20.3 a year ago to 19.7 in 1949. The 1947 rate was 22.7. Vancouver's death rate also dropped. It was 10.2 in 1949 compared with 11.1 in 1948.
