Lord Hugh Cecil, member for Oxford University, in a breezy speech in support of J. Austen Chamberlain's amendment, drew the jeers of the nationalists by declaring that the Ulsterites would be justified "in cutting themselves off from the bastard republic," which he said would be constituted if the veto bill was passed.

VETO BILL'S SECOND READING PASSES BRITISH COMMONS

LONDON, March 2.—Four days of the most uninspiring debate ever given to a measure involving a great constitutional reform, came to a conclusion tonight, when Premier Asquith applied closure and the second reading of the veto bill was passed by a majority of 125, the vote be-

ing 368 to 243. Prior to this the House divided on Austen Chamberlain's amendment with a majority of 121 against it.

The figures on the veto bill were greeted with prolonged cheers, after which the bill, on the premier's motion, was sent to the committee of

the whole house. This stage is likely to be deferred for some time, to enable the government to dispose of financial business.

The opposition leaders are drafting an elaborate series of amendments.

The appearance of Mr. Balfour in the debate gave a temporary flip to the otherwise dull proceedings, and although not in the best of form the former premier kept the interest alive, not always, however, to the complete advantage of his party.

For instance, expatiating on the value of the hereditary principle, he explained: "Let it be our servant; let it no longer be our master." This admission was received with a burst of laughter.

Pending the committee stage of the bill interest will now centre in the expected production next week of Lord Lansdowne's bill for the reform of the House of Lords.

Austen Chamberlain's amendment, which was defeated, was moved on Monday last on behalf of the opposition. It was to the effect that the house would welcome the introduction of a bill which, while reforming the composition of the House of Lords, maintained its independence as a second chamber, but declined to proceed with a measure for putting all effective legislative authority in the hands of a single chamber and offered no safeguard against grave changes made without the consent of the people.

Mr. Balfour described the present bill as the result purely of coercion brought by the Irish party upon the government. He declared that the consequence of the measure, if adopted, would be disastrous to the country and in a heated outburst concluded: "The government have imposed their proposals on the country by fraud."

This declaration threw the house into an uproar and there were cries of "withdraw." Speaker Lowther, however, ruled that the term "by fraud" could be applied to a party without an infringement of the rules of the house.

Premier Asquith, who followed, expressed a feeling of relief because the Tories had at last informed the country that the real motive inspiring the party which had taken up the reform of the second chamber was to make it stronger against the chosen representatives of the people. As to the charge of fraud and the pretence that the liberals were prosecuting the veto bill as a result of party exigencies, these were the fittest ever made in the House of Commons. THE YOUNG MEN'S MAN

DALLAS MEN REOPENING OLD MASCOTA MINE

GUADALAJARA, March 1.—Upon the arrival at Mascota of B.T. Connolly, vice-president and general manager of the Socorro Mining & Milling Company, who passed through Guadalajara today from Dallas, Texas, work of blocking out ore in the promising Socorro silver-gold mine located in the Navidad camp, will be resumed. Only a limited amount of development has been carried on during the last three months, due to the recent sale that was made of this property by Patrick Fitzgerald.

It is stated today that he will put a force of men at work immediately and begin taking out ore within a few weeks.

For the present the milling ore taken out in the development of the Socorro will be treated at the plant of the Lupta Mines Company, which is situated advantageously. A lot of Socorro ore which was run through that mill last year had an assay value of 800 grams silver and 12 grams gold, equal to \$22 American money per ton. At the time this ore was taken out of the mine a small shipment of high grade was made to one of the smelters which assayed 12,000 grams silver and 89 grams gold to the ton, equal to \$377 American currency. Forty-eight assays taken by J. G. Morrow, secretary of the Socorro company, last November, showed values ranging from \$2.50 to \$327 American money to the ton.

The best ore is coming from the breast of Tunnel No. 3, which has pierced the mountain a distance of 500 feet, at a depth from the apex of more than 500 feet. In this tunnel an immense ore body was encountered 200 feet from the entrance and driving was continued across it for 120 feet. Drift on the shoot have blocked out ore to keep a good sized mill going for a long time, but it is the purpose of the Texas men to open the ore bodies up thoroughly before erecting a plant. It is calculated that \$35,000 gold will be necessary to equip a mill with capacity to handle the ores of the Socorro on the most economical scale.

The Socorro group comprises nine claims with an extension of 247 acres, situated near the famous Sunde mine and the Lupta producer, in the Navidad camp, which is sixteen hours west from America by muleback, about fifty miles. The Potrero river, which passes through the holdings, carries at all times of the year sufficient water for a large reduction plant, and an abundance of timber is close at hand, both for mine purposes and for fuel. The climatic conditions are excellent, as they are in all of the mines of Jalisco, and work can be carried on every day in the year. Labor is plentiful at 75 cents per day for miners and less for common laborers.

The neighboring San Jose mine of the Sunde family has produced approximately \$200,000 in rich shipping ore during the last five years, and its reserves of milling ore would warrant the erection of a large mill.

The Lupta has a record of a half million pesos production. The Santa Lucia and San Roque have produced many thousands each and are only in their infancy. The Mirador, owned by Spaniards, has a record of production of a million pesos, has been worked for two centuries and is still yielding rich ore.
