Forrester, Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce, received a cable this morning from Mr. Lvrke, Canada's commercial agent at Sydney, stating that oats were selling at 62 cents for a 49 lb. bushel. Some time ago the price was 81 cents, so that there is evidently a big drop in the price.
