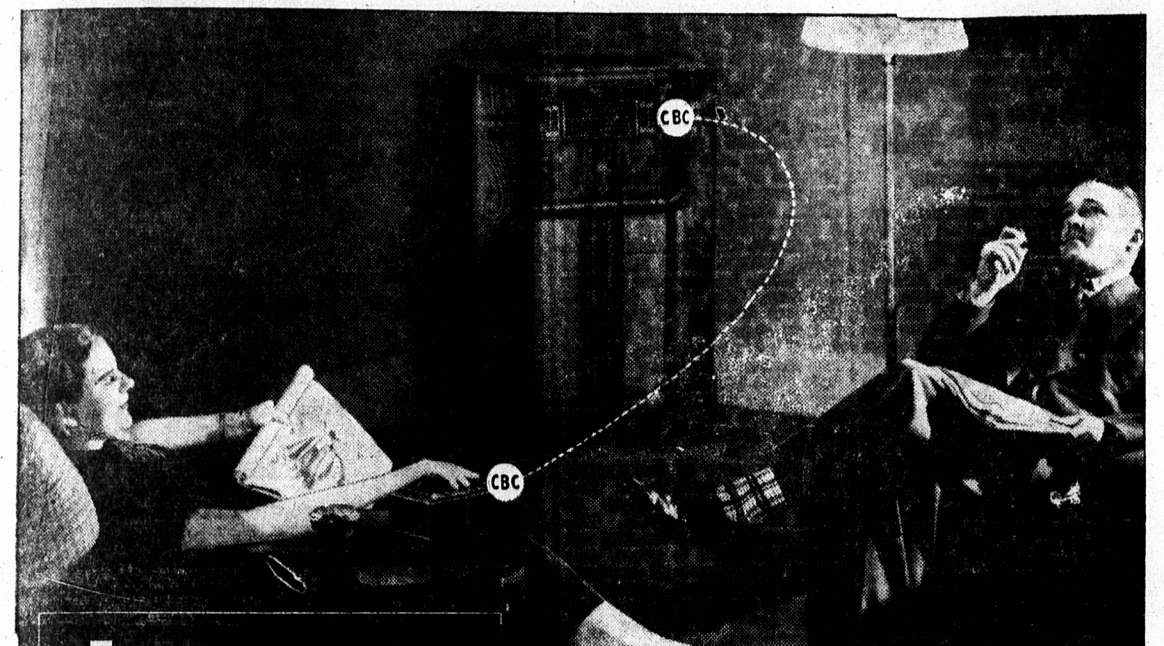

Petroleum Helps Support Country

The petroleum industry, along with other industries, has always been willing to support a reasonable and equitable tax program. But when discriminatory taxation reaches the point when the taxes paid annually by a single industry equal the total annual payroll, it is time that effective steps were taken to combat a situation that can only end in economic disaster.

As collectors of the gasoline tax, filling station operators large and small, may labor under the delusion that the public is paying the tax bill and the vendor himself is not losing any money in the operation. That is not the case. When one third of the amount the customer pays goes to the government, a good proportion of that one third would otherwise go into the purchase price of more petroleum products.

No one disputes that governments must levy taxes. But in recent years there has been a tendency either to make it too much

or to shift more of the load on the back of industry. Unfortunately, political reasons have sometimes been back of such policies. Letting George run the government has opened the door for politics and closed it to statesmanship.

CONFUCIAN RITE GIVEN STANDING

CALGARY, Oct. 21—A Confucian rite—the burning of a piece of paper bearing the name—instead of a kiss on a Christian Bible, was sanctioned here when a Chinese, "Shorly" Yuen, was called as a witness in a police court case.

When Yuen was asked to take the oath on the Bible he shook his head and said: "No savvy."

Frank Yee, an interpreter, was called. He asked for a piece of paper and a pen, asked Yuen several questions and had a police inspector set fire to the slip. While it burned Yuen repeated a strange Chinese chant after Lee.

Magistrate D. C. Sinclair asked the meaning of the ceremony. Lee explained Yuen had taken an oath that if he did not tell the truth he hoped his body would be consumed by flames as his name had been.

RECALLS BULL IN CHINA SHOP

PRIDDIS, Alta., Oct. 21—The bull in the China shop had nothing on a larger Aberdeen Angus which invaded a small general store here, driven by files and heat to seek shelter.

For more than two hours the animal defied efforts of Richard Standish, store owner, to eject him. When he finally left the toll was a counter wrecked; merchandise

scattered in all directions, with flour, sugar, rolled oats, tea and salt well mixed on the floor.
