

**Election Talk**

Meanwhile political observers in Ottawa are speculating on how the influence of the new trade agreements will have on the calling of a general election.

It is generally assumed that the present Government will go to the country next year, probably late in the summer.

Mr. Mackenzie King has said on several occasions that since the Canadian people put the Liberals back in power three years ago with a record-breaking majority there could be no reason for a general election until the statutory time limit is reached.

If the present Government went the limit in that regard it could delay the next election until the spring of 1941.
