There are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother the following children: - Miss Annie Smith, 64 Great George St., City; Mrs. A. M. Woodside, Vancouver, B.C.; Mrs. J.J. Marshall and Mrs. L.A. Lobsinger, both of Regina, Sask., who were at her bedside when she died.

Mrs. Smith's husband, James Edward, died in 1914, and one son Henry died in 1901. Another son, James Edward was killed in action in France in 1916. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. W.O. Davey, City, twelve grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Her funeral took place on Tuesday, Sept. 30 to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where the funeral mass was said by Rev. Mr. McPherson who also performed the rites at the grave.

The following friends and neighbors acted as pall-bearers: Messrs. Guy Scott, H. Bonnell, W.J. Bravender, J.P. McCloskey, Vincent Gilmour, Archie McFarlane. Interment was in the Catholic Cemetery.

Relevancy

Relevancy refers to a condition. A thing is as we say "irrelevant" when it is not suited to its position within that idea. It refers to a condition of fitness. We may be better see what it means by taking a few cases in which the idea of fitness is illustrated.

For instance, there is a story told (how true I cannot say) of a man who went to preach in an institution where the congregation was made up of people of low mentality. It was a mental hospital. He took as his subject "the sin of gadding about." He lost sight of his audience and their needs. That was an extreme case, but surely the mistake is often committed, when discourse is framed without the speaker first sitting down and asking himself what the actual needs of the audience were. Do they need comfort, or advice or encouragement? Otherwise it might be a case of utter irrelevancy. The means not suited to the end. In fact no real end in sight not even contemplated.

This is seen when people on a heady, that shows the snows of sixty winters; and conduct becoming a person in the thirties is most unbecoming in a person old enough to be a grandparent. Conduct should be fitting to the years.

There is a line in Horace about the "New Rich" where he declares: "How'er proud of your cash Rome's streets you range, Your breed, mere fortune cannot change."

They may try to prove to the public that money can buy culture, but it can't be bought with money alone. Nor can it be found over night. It takes time. This reminds one of what is said to have happened in Oxford once. An American tourist asked a man how they got such smooth lawns there "that is simple enough," said the man questioned. "We clip it and roll it and clip it and roll it for about five hundred years that is all." So with culture it depends on time.

There is a line in Horace about good fortune or some trick of the stock market.

As long ago as when Horace wrote the "Ars Poetica" he had the idea of congruity. He bids any writer to guard against using absurd combinations of antipathies. Can I do better than reproduce what he says on the subject?

"If in a picture, Pico, you should see a handsome woman with a fish's tail, Or a man's head upon a horse's neck, Or a mix of beasts of the most different kinds, Covered with feathers of all sorts of birds, Would you not laugh and think the painter bad? True, he, that book is as ridiculous, Whose incoherent style (like sick men's dreams) Varies all shapes, and mixes all extremes. Pairs and poets have been still allowed Their pencils, and their fancies, unconfined. This privilege we freely give and take; But nature, and the common laws of sense Forbid to reconcile antipathies, Or make a snake engender with a dove. And hungry tigers court the tender lambs."

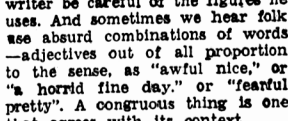
Thus he warns the would-be writer be careful of the figures he uses. And sometimes we hear folk use adjectives out of all proportion to the sense, as "awful nice," or "a horrid fine day," or "fearful pretty". A congruous thing is one that agrees with its context.

These are illustrations of what we deem the relevant.
