**CRYSTALS CLINCH ISLAND HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP**

**Defeating Abegweits Last Night By Score Of 5 To 4--Abegweits Rally In Dying Moments of Game Nearly Deadlock Score.--Record Attendance.**

The Prince Edward Island Hockey League series for 1928 has come and gone and with it went a provincial championship of little town of Summerside. Its history now, and the curtain will have to be moved back to be again raised eleven months from now on a number of new faces to once again battle in that good old fashioned way, in that same indomitable spirit and courage which typifies the Island bred hockeyists and athletes. The retiring call will beckon to many, but as always, others will fill the gap; the fans too will change, but not in enthusiasm, to make way for the great and thrilling sport of hockey--Canada's national game.  
Crystals, they of the black and white ensign returned to their respective homes last night, or rather this morning, in high spirits, bringing a good brand of hockey--as hockey goes in the Maritimes--Congratulations!  
To the Abegweits, yes; they who have been heralded in song and story--Congratulations! They played the game, never giving up the face of which at times looked like overwhelming odds. This was exemplified in last night's game, when a five to nil count was piled up against them. They went out in true Abbie spirit and all but held the victory by a score of 5 to 4. This team, therefore is deserving of all we can give them after such a display of superb hockey and courage.  
Last night's attendance brought one back to the bold old Sisssex days; when upwards of 1500 wildly cheering fans packed the arena and in the dying moments of the game lost their speech in the kaleidoscopic whirl of hockey. Last night's 1500 customers were not unlike the fans of some few years ago, who, draped in suspense as the last seconds sped by awaited for the inevitable to happen, drew a long breath and strained as the final bell rang and said, oh, well, such are the fortunes of hockey--then wended their way homeward to pray the game over a dozen times with a whole barrage of "ifs" before they reached their front doors.  
It was a record breaking attendance that waited until 9:22 when the teams were sent away by Lewy when Frank Brown, slatted to handle the game, but was delayed by a late boat.  
Nothing spectacular happened in the opening period, suffice to say that "Chick" Gaudet, wearing the washer from Saunders, instilled the Abbie red line, solved to surprise Collings with an easy shot. If the first counter was easy, the next was "Lulu" Jack Wright three minutes later stick-handled past the defence, tripped over a bundle of sticks, gave the disc one last parting love tap to nearly fall again with surprise when he learned that said disc slipped into the net like a culling stone between the spread-eagled legs of Collings.  
For the remainder of the period of eight minutes after the opening bell in the second period, "Chick" Gaudet, last night's scoring ace of the Crystals, went through unassisted and again forced Collings to look twice in an endeavor to locate the puck on a split-second wing shot. This human dynamo, playing centre faced off, sneaked the puck away from Diamond to count again, this time in eight seconds. Before the fans or even Collings recovered from the former's play, Gaudet repeated the feat another eight seconds. This whirlwind attack by the lone sharp-shooter had the fans and Abbie hockeyists spellbound for a moment, but to settle down was the red and black's only hope, and this they did, but to pile up three scores in seven minutes. All the counts came individually, but not before the way was paved with brilliant and scintillating hockey. Every score was earned and earned hard, as Crockett could have asked his way and this only after he was crowded to the wall.  
The Abegweil last score came in the third period when Jack Gordon, that spectacular and dangerous veteran of hundreds of hockey battles, snaked the puck through the Crystal lineup to rock the rink with cheers by a well deserved score. It looked very much as though the game would be deadlocked on the final bell. The red and black sextette playing four minutes, finally rained rubber on Crockett, but to no avail. He turned away everything that looked like a tying score to send the home fans

from the rink disappointed but still thinking that "Dame Fortune" smiled ruefully on their team. Spillet the fast Abbie defence crowned himself with well merited praise in last night's game. It was a lesson as to who was the most brilliant hero or Gallant of the visitors. His herculean efforts, and on three occasions, with great success, had the fans on their toes all the while.  
"Dempsey" Diamond's no scoring play followed him again last night. He had all of seventeen shots on the Crystal net, but could not sag the twine. He played hard hockey all winter, but last night far outshone himself. He was one of the stars of the game.  
Anderson and Gordon played havoc with the invaders' line at times during the game and worked like Trojans throughout. The remainder of the team gave their all, and what more can a hockey player do. They worked and worked hard every minute they were in action and have nothing to reproach themselves for.  
For the Crystals, Wright, Gallant and Schurman were outstanding, not forgetting to mention Crockett in the net.  
Time and space will not permit a more extended and detailed report of the game which did not end until nearly 11:30.

Toronto--The fresh egg market here is firmer and dealers quotation to country shippers have been advanced to extras 40 to 41, firsts 35 to 36, seconds 25 to 26 delivered. Prices to retailers are unchanged. Live fowl and ducks are in keen demand at much firmer prices.  
Vancouver--Practically all B. C. eggs on spot in the east have now moved and the market is firmer here. Prices to producers have advanced to extras 28, firsts 25, pullets extras 22. These prices to be retrospective for all this week's receipts. Prices to retailers are extras 33, firsts 30, pullet extras 27.
