### Must Pay Cash For Amateurs

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—(CP)—Governors of the National Hockey League, in probably their last session before the ice game gets under way for the winter, today announced President Frank Calder to sign an agreement with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association under which the N.H.L. pays cash for amateurs who sign pro contracts.

The all-day meeting, attended by representatives of all seven clubs, discussed at length the referee situation but spent most of its time going over clause by clause the agreement with the C.A.H.A.

This agreement, accepted in principle at the last meeting at which Dr. W. G. Hardy of Edmonton, representing the C.A.H.A., was present, had as its principal clause the question of payment by the N.H.L. to the C.A.H.A. of a sum of money to reimburse amateur clubs for their expenses in training players.

It was agreed that the N.H.L. will pay \$250 to the C.A.H.A. when any amateur player signs a contract offered by a professional club in a minor league affiliated with the N.H.L. If the player signs an N.H.L. agreement the C.A.H.A. receives an additional \$250.

The money will be disbursed by the C.A.H.A. in the place of players who the amateur received his training.

It was also decided that in cases where the player after signing is unable to find employment as a professional player, the N.H.L. will agree to the C.A.H.A. that the player be reinstated as an amateur.

The new agreement also covers the other leading amateur bodies, the British Ice Hockey Association and the Eastern Amateur Hockey Association of the United States, so that similar sums will be paid in the event that amateurs under the jurisdiction of these bodies, all of which with the C.A.H.A. are members of the International Hockey Association, are signed to professional contracts.

Calder settled an involved player dispute by deciding that Garnett Betts of Winnipeg is the property of Chicago Black Hawks, rather than of Montreal Canadiens. Full hearing was appealed to the full board which upheld him. Betts played last year with Wichita of the American Association and after that club folded up his services were in dispute between two groups mainly interested in the Wichita club. One of these groups decided to sell him to Canadiens, a second to Black Hawks. Calder ruled that the second group had the right to dispose of him.

Ar Ross, manager of Boston Bruins, offered to approach Bill Stewart, the referee and baseball umpire to see whether a dispute that has arisen over Stewart's ser-

vice can be settled before the season opens.

It was explained that the league this year decided to offer all referees a contract, similar to that given to players and coaches, containing a minimum salary and a release clause. Stewart balked at the release clause and in a letter to Calder said he was through.

The contract, similar to those offered to King Clancy and Mickey Lon, calls for a minimum guarantee of \$2,500 for the season, paid at the rate of \$75 a week. A referee working more than 46 games a season will receive more than the minimum.

## Percy Moore Is Chief Referee Of C.B.H. League

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Baseball is going to take its draft medicine without a shudder, but the major league magnates are keeping their fingers crossed and their ears to the ground nonetheless.

Bob Quinn, President of Boston Reds, summed up the attitude of most of the club owners in a survey made by the Associated Press: "I have been in the game over 50 years, during the Spanish and a few other wars. This is an American game and it never tried to hide. Baseball will be right there as always and do whatever America wants it to do."

There are approximately 500 players in the major leagues and some of these are almost certain to be summoned to one year's military service. However, a majority of them are married, or have other dependents, so that on any one club no more than half-a-dozen are likely to fall a class one of the draft, subject to immediate call.

One of the concerns of some big league clubs was the effect of the draft on minor league ball players of talent. A larger percentage of these are likely to be called up because they are younger and have fewer dependents.

## Maritime Boy Seeks Berth With Leafs

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 17.—(CP)—Bob Copp never played defence in hockey until a year ago. Yet his is bidding for a place on the Toronto Maple Leafs rear-guard at the club's N.H.L. training camp here. He hopes he makes it if only to please his bride of two weeks.

A native of Port Elgin, N.B., Copp is a student in dentistry at the University of Toronto. He is the first U. of T. student to ever come to the Leafs training camp.

Last year he played for Varsity seniors and started as a centre. Coach Ace Bailey had so many good forwards he decided to convert Copp into a defence man.

An English Rugby player at Mount Allison University before leaving the Maritimes, Copp thrived on the rugged play which is a defenceman's fate. The experiment was such a success Bailey, one-time Leaf player, passed the word along to Manager Conn Smythe of the Toronto club and Copp was asked to come to the training camp.

The curly-haired Maritime lad missed his year in dentistry last year by failing in one subject. This year he's concentrating on that same subject and is taking military training in the bargain.

If Copp doesn't make the grade with the Leafs he will play with Toronto Marlboros in the Senior Ontario Hockey Association but a Toronto contract, he says, is about the nicest thing he could take home to his bride.

## Football Season Opens On Saturday With St. Dunstons Meeting All Star Fifteen

The local football season will be ushered in on Saturday afternoon next when Father Walter McGuigan sends his Saint Dunstons University fifteen against an all-star squad picked from players in the City air pilots now stationed at the Guntery and Bombing School and two army boys.

Included in the list of players on the all-stars is three members of last year's Saints team, Harold Hennessey and Len Connolly, two fast, rugged forwards, and elusive Jack Coyle a backfield man. While this trio are the better known of the players on the new squad nevertheless rumor has it that there are several more making up the squad that will be a real test for the players in other parts of Canada and the Saints are expecting one of the toughest opening battles that they have ever received in recent years.

Saints with 10 of last year's intercollegiate team back in uniform have looked mighty good in practice sessions the past week and coach Father McGuigan is confident that his squad is on a par with the many fine teams turned out at the University in past years. In addition to last year's members there are four of last season's second squad who made the grade to the senior squad this year with the season being rounded out by the presence of a newcomer in the backfield, Frank O'Neil of St. John, N. B., who just recently captured the all round athletic title on the occasion of the holding of the annual sports at E.D.U.

Fans will welcome the news of the coming gridiron battle and it is almost a safe bet that those taking in the encounter will witness a lively bruising encounter all the way.

The game will be played on the University gridiron starting at 3 o'clock sharp with referee Jim McCallum handling the whistle blowing duties.

Jack Adams, manager of the Wings, said that in his opinion McAtee would stick in the major cup in his first year as a professional.

Adams said today that Syd Howe, one of the club's veteran stars, has not yet been tendered a contract but expects to come to terms during the coming weekend.

## 5 Bruins To Be Ironmen

HERSHEY, Pa., Oct. 17.—(AP)—After sending his Boston Bruins squad through today's double workout, Coach Cooney Weiland selected five players to play ironman roles when his National Hockey League club opens its exhibition season Saturday against Hershey of the American Hockey League.

The Bruins and Bears are scheduled to play a doubleheader, regulars against regulars and rookies against rookies. The Hershey team, which served as a Bruins' farm, cannot dress two full teams until Manager Art Ross makes his annual cut. Therefore Weiland has asked Flash Hollett, Red Hamill, Herb Cain, Art Jackson and Eddie Wiseman to play in both games.

Hamill will play defence for both Bruins teams but the other four Bruins will return to their own squad for the varsity game after competing for Hershey Cubs.

## Leaf Forwards Go Full Out

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 17.—(CP)—The snipers had their innings today as the Toronto Leafs set out to make up time lost to other National Hockey League clubs which started training earlier. As a result of this common desire on the part of the players, goals were as plentiful as fruit around the Niagara Peninsula. However, the absence of body checking by the defences had something to do with the scoring epidemic.

Two of the high marksmen were Gordie Drillon and Sweeney Schriner, veteran workmen who, at one time or other, have led N.H.L. scorers. Drillon and Schriner were flying in the morning workout and the former bagged at least five goals while the latter got four.

Drillon, about 10 pounds overweight at 197, was driving in hoping to shed excess pounds.

Bob Copp, rookie defenceman who played with University of Toronto last year, injured the thumb of his right hand and was forced to the sidelines.

The injury is believed to be only a sprain, at least, Copp, a native of Port Elgin, N.B., hopes it is.

## Black Hawks Resume Training

HIBBING, Minn., Oct. 17.—(CP)—Chicago's Black Hawks of the National Hockey League got in their first real workout today after a five-day jolt caused by lack of ice.

John Mariucci, former University of Minnesota defence star, joined the squad today. Mariucci had been the only absentee.

## IS PROMOTED

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 17.—(CP)—Promotion of Sqdn. Ldr. H. A. W. Dickson to the rank of wing commander was announced today. He has been in charge of the Royal Canadian Air Force Depot here since its establishment.

Wing Cmdr. Dickson, a native of Nova Scotia, served in the first Great War with the 85th battalion commanded by Col. J. L. Ralston, now minister of national defence. He was attached to headquarters staff at Ottawa before coming to Moncton and previously served at various posts from Dartmouth, N. S., to Winnipeg.

## GERMAN PILOTS GO "ANTI-NAZI"

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(CP)—The Daily Sketch, in its column "Inside Information," tells of a German aviator who bailed out somewhere in England and floated down to earth wearing a fur coat and carrying a suitcase full of personal belongings. He explained to the startled soldiers who arrested him that he was an anti-Nazi and had been given a "suicide" job to do. The paper said, and added:

"Disclosures he made to intelligence officers included: Luftwaffe morale has been undermined by the heavy losses the R.A.F. is inflicting and the devastating British A. A. fire; pilots protesting against 'suicide' bombing attacks are told retributory measures will be taken against their relatives."

"Dissatisfied Nazi pilots have been taken back to Germany from France as prisoners, and Gestapo agents have now been drafted into all airdrome ground staffs."

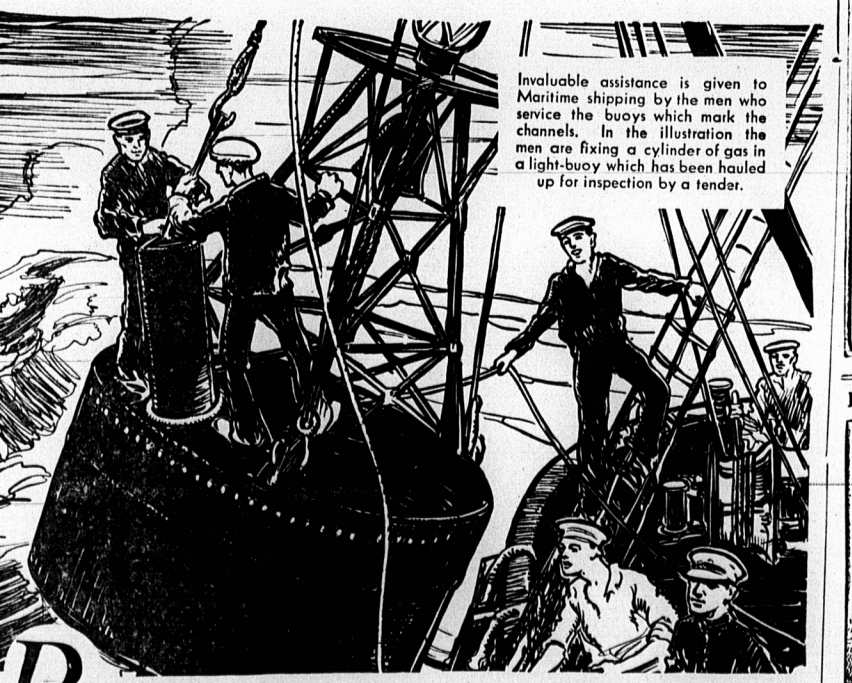
