The cry goes up in Great Britain, every now and then, and with greater intensity, it would appear when a Liberal Government is in power, that the loyalty of the people is becoming weak. This may be due to the efforts of the Jingopre s, which is ever ready to create alarm over the policy of retrenchment which is applied in regard to navy and army expenses by Liberal governments, but there is probably far less in the cry than one would suppose. It is another case, more than likely, of the vocal minority howling in chorus.

Be that as it may, an English newspaper refers to the matter for the purpose of giving prominence to a poem by Wilfred Campbell, our distinguished Canadian poet, as follows.

To his eyes, we seem to be lost in petty disputes. He pictures the empire calling for captains and pilots—and calling in vain. Whatever be the opinion of our readers on this poetic view of the actual conditions, we think that few of them will be able to read these inspiring verses without feeling their patriotism kindled by the call. If Mr. Campbell achieves this result he will have performed the part of a genuine poet. It is well that we should be reminded occasionally that the good of the empire is too vast a subject to suffer by our temporary disagreements and controversies.

THE VALPARAISO EARTHQUAKE.

It appears as if the disaster which befell San Francisco and a large portion of the State of California on the morning of the 18th April last, has been repeated on a larger scale in South America, and that Valparaiso, an important city and seaport of Chile, with a population of 120,000, and several other largely populated cities have suffered greatly from earthquake. The loss of life has been deplorable, and there has been grievous destruction of property.

A remarkable thing in connection with this latest outbreak is the fact that it confirms the predictions of a number of seismologists, of world wide reputations, who at the time of the San Francisco upheaval, foretold further seismic disturbances, possibly in the Caribbean Sea region, and almost certainly in South America. We have at hand the elaborately wrought out prophecy of a leading light in this line of study, wherein it is plainly stated that from the 19th to the 22nd of the present month would be the center of a seismic period, with a maximum of earthquake tendencies, culminating on or about the 19th. This forecast has been fulfilled in a remarkable manner.

It may reassure our readers to know that those who have delivered opinions on this subject with more or less knowledge, have confirmed the danger field to Central and South America, and that nothing has been placed in the calendar to come our way save an exceptionally hot wave—which, by the by, seems to have already arrived.
