NEW APPOINTMENT.

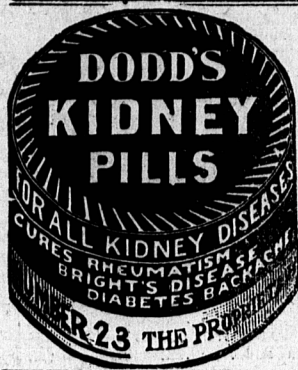

The prices quoted by the wholesalers are—Potatoes, 50 to 55c; pressed hay, \$13; white oats, 55 to 65c; black oats, 58 to 60c; pork, 9 to 10 1/2c; straw, \$5.50, and turnips, 20c.

A magnificent floral wreath has been received by Boyne and St. George's Lodges L.O.L., Charlottetown, from the Orangemen of Halifax for the purpose of decorating the grave of their departed brother W. Haywood, who died about a year ago on board the Niobe while she was in this port.
