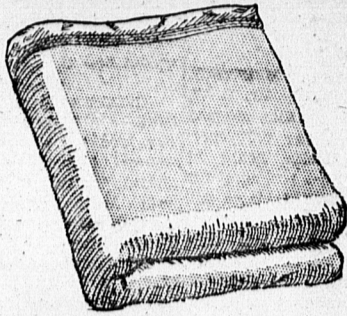

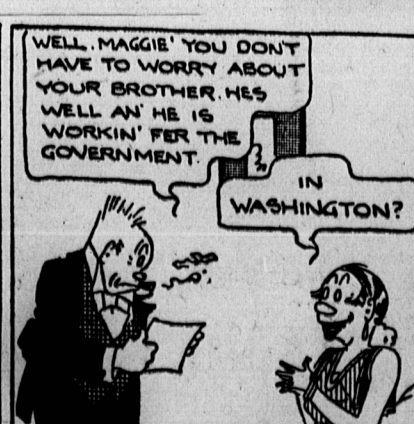
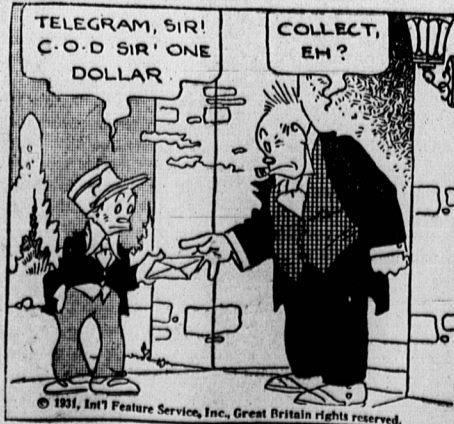
—ELDERLY RESIDENT PASSES

—ADDRESSES SUMMERSIDE CHILDREN—Mr. W. D. Bayley, B.A. Director of Temperance Instruction for the Province of Manitoba, addressed the pupils of the Summerside High School on Friday morning on the subject of Scientific Temperance. He spoke to the primary grades first, and the children were keenly interested in his illustrations of the effect of alcohol on plants and birds. Election Charges Dismissed

THREE RIVERS, Que., Nov. 27—(By The Canadian Press)—Election contestation motions against Maurice L. Duplessis, Conservative candidate elected for Three Rivers in the last provincial elections, and William Peter Grant, successful Liberal candidate in Champlain, were dismissed in Superior Court today by Mr. Justice Aime Marchand.

The Three-Rivers motion was disqualified on the grounds that Henri Bellemare, one of the two who signed the petition, testified during the hearing of preliminary objections that he agreed to sign the contestation motion on the understanding that he would be given a job.

Evidence showed, according to Judge Marchand, that the motion against Mr. Grant had not been filed within thirty days of publication of the Quebec official Gazette of election results in Champlain. The signatories of the petition also testified they had accepted whiskey during political meetings.
