The members of the North Star dramatic Company who played in this City this week, went to Summerside yesterday morning. They have had hard luck of late and were practically abandoned because of poor returns. Their benefit at the Opera House on Thursday night netted each performer about \$6 out of which they paid \$5 for board. They were pretty good actors too and made friends here who regretted their ill-luck.

The Rev. J. W. Godfrey until recently rector of Crapaud, seems to have caused a stir in Sydney, since performing charge of his parish there. The Sydney Record says: Speaking in the Record this morning with respect to the criticism of "Worshipper" in yesterday's issue, Rev. Mr. Godfrey of Christ church, expressed his surprise that his sermon on Sunday morning had been construed into an attack on the present federal administration. "My terms were general," said the rev. gentleman, "and I am sure the public would take that view of the matter after a perusal of that portion of the sermon which seems to be under criticism. Following Empire Day and preceding Victoria Day celebration, I endeavored to adapt my theme to the occasion, and to indicate those moral dangers which threaten the welfare of the nations. On Sunday morning last, Rev. Mr. Godfrey preached from St. Luke 17, 37, "And they answered and said unto him, Where, Lord? And he said, Wheresoever the body is thither the eagles will be gathered together." The following is the extract from the sermon to which the rev. gentleman alludes: "It is well for us at times to make a pause in our search for signs of God's judgment in the past or among foreign nations, and to ask whether there is not something among ourselves to call down Divine vengeance. Perjury has become so frequent and so unblinking in the courts of law that the administration of justice is hampered and in some cases is made impossible. While among the political parties of this Dominion there is growing ever more and more evident deep seated corruption and a selfish grasping after personal rewards among those in consideration ought to be for the honor and welfare of the community they represent, such as our fathers dreamed of."

Yesterday a thunder and lightning storm which first manifested itself about 5 a. m. played around Charlottetown and vicinity all day. Although the middle portion of the day was free from rain showers prevailed from about three o'clock until dark. The lightning was not very severe, although it appears to have been much worse in the western part of the Province. The "old jail" that dilapidated structure which is the chief eyesore of Charlottetown is receiving certain attentions which it is hoped are only a prelude to its removal. The decrepit fence surrounding it is being propped up by certain gallow-like devices, which do not add to the beauty of the institution. There was something said some time ago about transporting this old building, but the project seems have become stuck somewhere.

At the railway wharf, or what remains of the old wharf, the truckmen employed in unloading and men find themselves some what cramped for space to operate their "horse-elevators." They use strong language on occasion, as was demonstrated the other day when there were three or four large schooners waiting to discharge and gravel. When the new wharf is completed, however, there will be accommodation for ocean liners. F. W. Hyndman of this City went over to Yarmouth a few days ago to be present at the trial of the new str. Harland, the new boat which is designed for the ferry service on East and West Rivers and the Orwell and Crapaud routes, formerly served by the City of London. Yesterday he telegraphed that the trial had been very successful and that the Harland was a fine boat and everything satisfactory. This is good news for those for whom the new steamer will be a utility and for those who are looking forward to the pleasant excursions which will be made possible when the Harland is put on her schedule. All these will be asked to appoint representatives. A meeting will be held at an early date when the organization as suggested will be completed and a constitution adopted as a working basis of the League. Committees are already at work on some definite phases of moral reform, and it is expected shortly that the League will be in a position to seek pledges from representatives of Parliament with a view of suppressing corruption or other irregularities.

The City by-laws specifying and levying the rate of assessment on real and personal property in the City of Charlottetown for the current year were read a third time and passed at a meeting of the City
