### Billy Holland Chalks Up New Record In Winning 500-Mile Automobile Race

By Charles Danley INDIANAPOLIS, May 30 (AP)—Fortune rode alongside jubilant Billy Holland in the 500-mile automobile race today.

Holland, 41-year-old driver of Reading, Pa., scorched the bricks of the Indianapolis motor speedway with record-breaking speed to win in 4 hours, 7 minutes, 15.97 seconds. He averaged 121.327 miles an hour, fastest time in the 33-year history of the event.

This performance blotted out the track record of 119.813 miles an hour established by Mauri Rose, South Bend, Ind., in winning the 1948 race.

Holland won with five miles to spare. Closest to Holland, winner of about \$45,000 in prize money, was Johnny Parsons, Burbank, Calif. George Connor, Los Angeles, was third. Myron Fehr, of Milwaukee, a first-time driver in the event, finished fourth. Fifth was Joe Chiswood, Cherokee Indian from Reading, Pa.

While the ultimate plaudits of the holiday crowds of around 160,000 went to Holland, the real thrills of the race were supplied in the first 100 miles when three drivers were involved in smash-ups.

The most severely injured was Duke Nalon of Los Angeles, who set a record-breaking pace for the first 50 miles. His car plunged into an outside retaining wall on the northeast turn and burst into flames. Nalon quickly jumped from the blazing car but suffered painful second-degree burns about the arms and face.

The other two drivers miraculously escaped with minor injuries. The race had not gone five miles before the car driven by George Lynch of Detroit spun off the track at the dangerous south turn and crashed. Lynch suffered a broken ankle.

Charles Von Acker, veteran driver from South Bend, Ind., escaped without injury when his car crashed into a retaining wall as he was starting down the home stretch on his 27th mile.

The terrifying speed proved convincingly that the drivers could take it but the machines could not. Twenty of the original starting field of 32 failed to survive the punishing grind either through accidents or motor failure.

Holland, driving the same four-cylinder front-drive racer in which he finished second in the 1947 and 1948 events, snatched the lead from Lee Wallard of Schenectady, N.Y. Wallard was forced to quit because of a leak in his car's fuel system. He was in front at 160 miles and never was headed.

Mr. Smith was runner up for the junior Island title for three consecutive years and also Island open runner up in the 1947 tournament at which prominent players from Upper Canada took part. Miss Sally Basler will be the secretary and Mr. Lane MacDowell treasurer.

### Turn Down Umpires Ass'n.

SYDNEY, N. S., May 30 — (CP) — The executive of the five-team Cape Breton Colliery Baseball League today refused to recognize the newly-formed Colliery League Umpires Association and turned down its demand for higher pay.

The association, representing 14 league umpires, was formed Sunday prior to a special meeting with the executive.

League President D. W. MacAdam wired George Barr, United States National League umpire chief for assistance in hiring new umpires.

Henry (Pop) Carrington presented the umpire's demands to the executive. They included: minimum wages of \$12.50 a game for plate umpires and \$10 for base umpires; use of three men in each game; payment of travelling expenses by the league; half pay for postponed games; and free passes for umpires' wives.

The umpires said they would attempt to re-open negotiations.

### To Use Starting Gate At Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., May 30 — (CP) — A starting gate will be used in Cape Breton for the first time in the June 6 King's Birthday harness racing card at the Sydney Sports Centre, President Dr. A. Calder announced today.

The gate is being brought here from Charlottetown.

Four classes, a Free For All, 2:22, 2:27, and 2:30 will be run. Starters in the Free For All include Scott Spencer, top horse in the Maritime last season, Oydonic, Wilken, Karl Frisco and P. J. Cadegan's young newcomer, Filbert.
