CHARGED WITH STEALING FROM POST OFFICE

Emanuel Steele, Postmaster At Miscouche Remanded On \$2,000 Bail.

SUMMERSIDE, Jan. 30.—On information laid by Post Office Inspector Wheatley of Charlottetown, Sheriff MacDonald left Summerside about nine o'clock this morning with a warrant for the arrest of Emanuel Steele, Postmaster at Miscouche on a charge of stealing money from the Post Office. He brought the prisoner to Summerside where he appeared before Magistrate Alexander Campbell on the charge stated. No witnesses were called or evidence given and the accused was remanded to bail in the sum of \$2,000 to appear before the Magistrate at the Court House in Summerside for trial on Monday next.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED RE EXPORT TUBERS

New Size Limit Of Table Stock Specified, Will Guard Against Shipping Table Stock For Seed.

A meeting of potato shippers, dealers, and growers to discuss several phases relating to seed potatoes in Prince Edward Island was called by the Dominion Seed Inspection Service, and took place in Prince of Wales College yesterday. Mr. A. E. Dewar presided. At the opening of the meeting Mr. John Tucker, Chief Seed Potato Inspector, was called upon to explain the object of the meeting, which in effect was the proposed changes in the Destructive Insect and Pest Act. Owing to the possibility existing of shipping seed potatoes as "Canada No. 1," as "Certified Extra No. 1," in other words of shipping table stock potatoes for seed purposes, a resolution amending the act was introduced and adopted. The consensus of opinion of everyone present was that the "Extra No. 1" should be reserved for seed purposes only.

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Perjury Charge Against Auger

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—The swearing out of a charge of perjury against Louis M. Auger was the latest development at noon today in the sensational case against the former member of Parliament for Prescott County. The levelling of the new charge came on the heels of an acquittal by jury on the count of criminally assaulting a 17 year old girl and a legal tangle as to whether the accused might face trial on a charge of seduction before a Judge or Jury. The warrant against Auger on the perjury charge was sworn out on instructions of Mr. Justice W. E. Ranev who presided at the third trial of the ex M. P. on the charge of criminal assault. The new charge grew out of the statement of Auger under oath that a woman had not been in his room in the House of Commons on the morning of Feb. 14th, 1929, when it was visited by two detectives of the Commons' staff. The sworn statements of the officers were said by the Court to be to the effect that they had discovered a woman in the room.

Degree Victim Sues for \$47,000

TORONTO, Ont. Jan. 30.—A hand that slipped during lodge initiation ceremonies resulted in serious head injuries to Alexander Wakefield, according to advice heard before Mr. Justice Garrow in the Assize Court today. Wakefield is suing the Grand Orange Lodge for \$47,514.75 personal damages arising from the fall he suffered when being initiated into the Orange Order here last November.

HAMILTON, Ont. Jan. 30.—J. W. Rattenbury, for four years manager of the Burlington Branch of the Bank of Commerce admitted before Magistrate Barr in Burlington today the theft of \$28,492 and forgery of 25 notes and was sentenced to two years in the reformatory.

Imprisoned Diver Is Brought to Surface Dead

MONTREAL, Jan. 20.—The Ontario Paper Company's office here today announced the death of Peter Trans, diver, who was submerged for three days all but one hour at their plant at Pointe Aux Outardes on the Ontario River on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. Trans, who was brought to the surface at 7.30 this morning after divers had cut away a portion of the coffer dam that was holding him imprisoned, was dead when taken from the water, the company learned in meagre reports from the scene. Their doctors were holding an examination to decide the cause of death and time at which the diver succumbed. The three day fight to keep the man alive and rescue him from his precarious situation thus ended in failure this morning. Faithful and constant maintenance of pumps to send a current of air through his helmet; an aeroplane dash through storm and snow and diving by inexperienced but willing volunteers all aided in making the story of his imprisonment twenty feet under water an epic of the north shore. Peter Trans, thirty years of age, born in South Jutland, Denmark, was married about six years ago and was the father of two sons who are at present with their mother in Denmark. Trans left there about two years ago and intended to bring them out this Spring. He was for three years a diver in the German navy and was one of the most experienced divers in the country. He was a heavily built man weighing about 200 pounds, was in perfect physical condition and described by his associates here as a most jovial fellow. In Montreal he lived at the Denmark Club, Dorchester Street.

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Annual Meeting Swine Breeders

Successful Year In Industry Reported With Some Criticism Offered.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Swine Breeders' Association was held last evening in Prince of Wales College with Mr. W. R. Shaw presiding in place of Mr. W. J. Reid, who was unavoidably absent. Mr. Shaw outlined briefly the progress of the swine industry since co-operative marketing was inaugurated. Previous to that time poor prices were prevalent. There was considerable opposition against the co-operative movement and as a result the organization at first was a failure from the financial standpoint. With the coming of the Dominion Live Stock Branch, and of the shipping club the industry took a new lease of life under the co-operative plan. There is doubtless slight irritations between members, dealers and the officials, but this situation can be contrasted favourably with old conditions. When the organization finds that the product has been sold at a disadvantage the fact is kept quiet, but in the case of a club doing the same thing the fact soon becomes known, with resulting criticism. The blame is too often placed on officials without looking into the actual cause of conditions. The great advantage coming through different co-operative organizations has caused a general satisfaction. As was pointed out at a general meeting in March last that the preceding season was very successful—so successful that little hope was held of equalling that year's record. The ensuing season, however, was equally, if not more, successful. A fact which should be emphasized is the advisability of placing the hogs on market during the summer months, during the period of high prices. No great difficulty should be experienced in getting hogs on market at this time if warm housing is provided during the winter. The same principle applies to the sale of lambs. The holding of lambs till fall glut the market with an ensuing decline in price. The question of feeds was taken up at the last meeting. The feed board

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LATEST DOINGS AT THE NAVAL CONFERENCE

(Special to the Guardian)
LONDON, Jan. 30.—The entire question of how to measure naval power, whether by total tons or by tons in separate categories, a problem which has vexed naval limitation negotiations for years, was put today in the hands of a special committee by the London Naval Conference. This plan of treatment will be adopted on the motion of Col. H. Stimson, head of the U. S. delegation and the U. S. Secretary of State at a full session of the Conference permeated by a general willingness to compromise, but marked nevertheless by plain reiterations of diverse national viewpoints. The proposal was accepted unanimously although Italy gave notice that she felt her claim for parity with France should have had precedence and that she would accept the decisions regarding limitation only on condition that she have a day in Court later. The London Conference discussed methods of procedure and principle for an hour and 15 minutes and adjourned after adopting secretary H. L. Stimson's resolution referring its most pressing problems to a committee. The session was marked by two outstanding events. First, Dino Grandi, Italian Foreign Minister, insisted that until the conference had determined the two issues raised by his country determination of ratios and maximum levels of naval strength, Italy was not prepared to make any final decision on the questions raised by other countries. SYDNEY, Australia, Jan. 30.—(Vancouver Province cable.) A sum of \$5,000,000 to provide work for unemployed has been voted for by the Federal Government. Prime Minister Goullin in a conference with state Premiers on the unemployment situation stated that amount would be made available for the highways fund, on condition that relief work would be put in hand immediately. To this the Premiers agreed.
