ESTIMATES LOSS

The Hon. T. W. L. Frowse, M.L.A., president of Frowse Bros. Ltd., informed The Guardian last night that the amount of goods stolen from their store in last Friday night's burglary was impossible to estimate owing to the large stock of general merchandise and clothing carried. His estimate was, however, that between \$300 and \$500 worth of goods were stolen and that the amount could easily be much greater.

ARSON TRIAL CONTINUED

The trial of Cornelius McDonald on a charge of arson before Judge C. Gavan Duffy opened yesterday morning at 11 o'clock and adjourned at 1 P.M. until this morning at 11. The evidence of C. G. Peter Morrison, R.C.M.P., was completed by Frank Davis, special investigator for the Fire Insurance Underwriters, who was still on the stand when the Court adjourned. G.R. Holmes appeared for the Crown and R.R. Bell for the accused. The charge of arson against McDonald arose from two fires, one at 2 A.M. and the other at 4 A.M. on May 12. One fire occurred in the horse stable and the other in the saddle barns on the Exhibition grounds.

De Gaulle To Visit United States Soon

PARIS, May 28 — (Reuters) — Gen. De Gaulle, with the unanimous support of his cabinet, has decided to accept President Truman's invitation to visit the United States. It was leaked tonight. Though no official announcement has yet been made, it is understood that Gen. De Gaulle welcomes the opportunity to talk with Mr. Truman. Only the practical details of the journey remain to be worked out.

Hopkins In Moscow

MOSCOW, May 28 — (AP) — Harry Hopkins arrived by plane today on a special mission for President Truman. The Presidential adviser was met at the Moscow airdrome by Andrei Vishinski, vice commissar for Foreign Affairs. They greeted each other warmly. Vishinski inquiring after Mr. Hopkins' health, Mr. Hopkins then presented his wife to the Soviet official.
