CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP) — Grain futures were steady to firm Saturday with Dec wheat setting new high price last May and the deferred wheat contracts reaching new seasonal peaks.
WINNIPEG, Dec. 11 (CP) — Ry. futures closed 1/4 cent higher in a moderately active session Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. December closed at 109 1/8.
Good buying was credited to American houses during the trade. No export business was reported.

TORONTO, Dec. 10 (CP) — After dipping in the opening hour, the gold stocks tightened up in the final period of Saturday's Toronto Exchange Market to a net advance of .12. The Base Metal Index gained 3/8 with steel and iron prices advanced by the industry. The Western Oils advanced 1/8 to 34.000 shares was the heaviest Saturday market in more than a month.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (CP) — Pivotal industrial stocks abetted by falls but the over-all stock market was at another 1-year peak Saturday in the fast-paced dealings in more than six months although profit-taking handicapped the rise. The aggregate of 1,444,800 shares was the largest for a Sat., since June 17 and compared with 706,650 the previous Saturday.

MONTREAL, Dec. 10 (CP) — Under leadership of papers, a unitary strong tone was displayed in active trading week on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market and papers, industrials, utilities and banks went to new peaks in the indices. Golds were marked down a bit.

On Saturday, individual new highs were registered in papers by Price, Dominion, M. & O., Brown preferred international paper and Dycen. Ahead were Consolidated Paper and McLaren while down were St. Lawrence, Corcoran, "A", Abitibi 6 per cent preferred, Fraser, Howard Smith and, for a while, Abitibi Common.
