CHRISTMAS TREES

(Special to The Guardian) MONCTON, Oct. 24—The annual movement of Christmas trees from the Maritime Provinces has commenced. From now until the end of November the trees will be hewn down and hauled to railway points for bundling, after which they will be shipped to New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and other large American cities.

Large quantities are handled by the Canadian National Railways each year and this year, it is expected,

will exceed previous years by a considerable amount owing to restrictions which the law places in some parts of the United States in connection with tree cutting. American dealers in increasing numbers are turning each year to the great Canadian forests for their spruce and fir trees.
