### MAGNIFICENT DISPLAY OF EASTER BEEF

One of the finest displays of Easter beef ever shown in Charlottetown is that which is on exhibition at the stall of Messrs. Saunders, Newsum & Co., in the east end of the Market Building.

A representative of this paper was shown this beef last evening, and it certainly compares most favourably with the many magnificent showings of prime Easter meat displayed by this enterprising firm in former years. It certainly is a sight to gladden the eyes and heart of any lover of well-bred, well fed and properly dressed beef.

There are eight carcasses of beef in all in this exhibit. The weights of the live cattle have already been published and, needless to say, the beef is fully up to the standard which might be expected from such superior stock.

Worthy of special note is a carcass aptly labelled "Baby Beef." It is from an animal only twenty-two months old which was fed by J. W. Stewart & Son, of Bellevue Farm, the live weight of which was 176 pounds and which dressed 705 pounds of dainty and toothsome looking meat as one would wish to see.

The carcass of a heifer dressed by Mr. Frank Sanderson, North River is also deserving of special praise, the rich layers of fat mingling very evenly with the meat.

A couple of carcasses fed by the firm themselves give a splendid idea of what proper feeding and good handling will do, and are well worth inspecting.

Three lambs from the Experimental Farm are also shown and have been most favourably commented upon. The firm also show their usual Easter display of hams, bacon, lard, poultry, etc., etc.

The stock is immaculately clean and buying here at Easter, as well as at any other time, is a pleasure and source of satisfaction.

### HON. H. D. MCEWEN CONTINUES DEBATE

He had paid \$60,000 odd for it and had made it a present to the province for the sake of suffering humanity. The hon. member said he would take it back and refund every dollar that had been paid on it, if the Leader of the Opposition would move a resolution to that effect. I can imagine those gentlemen in solemn conclave with their heads knotted, questioning themselves the knotty question: "What the mischief are we going to do about this thing? We are up against it. We have to put up a gigantic bluff and talk eloquently and long and say this is a constitutional question, and so on and so on." It was precisely what the Leader of the Opposition would designate a pure bluff. All they could say in reply to the challenge of the hon. member for Tignish was, that the government did not know the first principles of Parliamentary procedure! Fine words, which the Leader of the Opposition is a specialist, but not a reply to the challenge. It is exceedingly regrettable that we cannot at least be honest in not accepting the year's public documents as they are; but there is only one explanation, they sincerely hope that all their contentions and juggling of the figures and facts may have some effect on the country. They are POLITICAL CONJURERS. They want to get back on this side of the House. My friend from the west last year said that they wanted to get the sun off their backs, but I will tell him that if the Opposition continue their present tactics THEY WON'T GET THERE. The people are wise and can see through their bluff, and they know that it would be bad business and bad politics to have the other side in power again. What would the proprietors of a business do if they had a man running their business for twenty years and having a deficit every year and every year promising to do better the next year? Would they think of reverting to that retrogressive policy after another and a more progressive man who understood his business, had taken charge of affairs? There never was a government more careful of the expenditure of public money, more zealous in trying to promote the welfare of the country than the men who compose the present government. If it without the slightest fear of contradiction they know of public accounts as they are set forth today, deserves to be stood up in a corner and decorated with a dunce's cap, the hon. gentlemen opposite may complain but they know differently. They charged the Commissioner of Public Works with terrible things at the time of the Souris bye-election in connection with the Arsenault affair, and when given an opportunity to prove their charges THEY FAILED, AS THEY KNEW THEY WOULD. They were given an opportunity to tell all they knew of the affair to bring it to a head, but when it came to the point they unannouncedly exonerated the Commissioner of Public Works from any connection with the matter. The purpose of carrying the First District of King's, and they failed. The cat and hay question were also exploded and we heard nothing about them this year. The contemptible insinuations thrown across the floor of the House would disgust a donor and almost deter him from buying hay on the island; and when the matter was looked into everything was found to be perfectly straight.
