### W. C. T. U. NOTES

SIXTY YEARS CRUSADING IN MANITOBA 1886-1946

In 1883 the year that Winnipeg's present City Hall was built, Mrs. Leilitt Youmans of Picton, Ontario, came to Manitoba to organize the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Frances Willard had a worldwide outlook and in her constitution has a place for all classes, young and old (she herself was a young woman who had made a study of human interests), rich and poor, black and white (right here, a fine negro Union carried on for years), red and yellow (Indian girls were reached and some Japanese and Chinese were members in our province). There was a place to develop and make use of any type of talent—all were needed and welcomed. A little white ribbon bow was the badge, the motto—to educate, agitate and legislate, for Christian citizenship. The Golden Rule, and Franchise for Women. These were some of the studies. Women's Rights to property and home, labor an honorable thing with proper hours of work, child labor protection, good health laws and education for all, the right for women to vote used as a means towards good citizenship. Through the study of Parliamentary procedure a way was found to reach towards these goals.


What was accomplished by the W. C. T. U. that always affiliated and cooperated with other Christian citizenship endeavours?

A home was established where girls coming to the city might board and have a suitable environment, which was later sold.

Traveller's Aid work established at railway stations supported the Home of the Friendless, visited hospitals and jails, helped the needy systematically and quietly (Flower Aid Dept.), helped the Humble Society, and placed some drinking fountains in Winnipeg streets, got unfermented wine accepted in most Protestant Churches for Sacrament, started the first Bible Vacation Schools in Winnipeg, placed Temperance lessons in the International Sunday School leaflets and good books in the libraries, also a Literature Depository for temperance study in Manitoba, put temperance text books in the public schools and a scientific chapter in C. I. T. and C.S.E.T. Year Books for young church workers, helped organize the Local Council of Women, started a Loyal Temperance Legion (Band of Hope) after a few years the Winnipeg School Board allowed these L.T.L. classes to be conducted from 4 to 5 o'clock in the schools, thus the best contact for temperance teaching in public schools in any part of the world was established.

Sixty years of organized effort cannot be told in a few words. The W. C. T. U. has a large place in Manitoba among groups of earnest Christian women who made women responsible voting citizens and helped frame laws of social reform and security of the home.

The Crusade begun in Manitoba sixty years ago under Frances Willard still goes on.

### RESPECT FOR LAW AND ORDER

The question has frequently been asked why it is that the British people are so law-abiding and have such a respect for law and order, while with the Americans and Canadians, the law is made to be broken. The explanation given is that in Great Britain there are certain penalties prescribed for every infraction of law, not too severe for minor offenses, but adequate to the case, and that for every offense, punishment follows, swiftly and surely.

That is the point—punishment is sure to follow: "every transgression receives its just recompense of reward" and the would-be transgressor knows that, and pauses to consider before he commits the transgression. He respects the law.

In America on the contrary and in Canada almost as much so, the laws are frequently looked on with contempt. Wealthy criminals, even murderers, engage clever lawyers, and often "get away with it."

In Prince Edward Island we go a step further. The Government violates the traditions of democracy in passing amendments contrary to
