TOTAL OF \$503,437 RAISED FOR ST. DUNSTAN'S.—A grand total of \$503,437 for Catholic higher education on Prince Edward Island through improved facilities at St. Dunstan's College has been raised to date through the contributions of 8,110 Catholics of Prince Edward Island and Magdalen Islands in a fund-raising campaign conducted under the guidance of Most Rev. James Boyle, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, diocesan campaign chairman announced today. This figure of \$503,437 more than doubles the announced objective of \$250,000, and although the campaign activity is nearing its end, Dr. MacMillan said that later reports were expected to increase the final total to some extent.

By CURT REISS. Copyright, 1945, NEA Service, Inc. NEAR GERMAN-CZECHOSLOVAK BORDER.—Hermann Goering's wife, Frau Emmy Goering, told me that Adolf Hitler's personal physician sought on one occasion to poison the Fuehrer.

The exact time of this alleged incident she did not disclose, and there is a certain mystery inherent in the remainder of what she told me about it. She did give the reason. It was, according to her, because the doctor realized that Hitler was mad. Here is the story as she told it to me.

The Fuehrer had two physicians, Morell and Brandt. Morell decided that his patient should die. So into a prescription he put a quantity of strychnine that, in course of time, would have been lethal. By chance Doctor Brandt saw the prescription. He recognized its significance, and rushed to Hitler.

"My Fuehrer," he cried, "Morell wants to murder you." Hitler listened to Brandt's story and sent for Morell, with whom he had a long talk. Then he called Brandt back. He told Brandt that while he appreciated him, he had decided that one doctor was enough, and he would stick to Morell.

"I don't know whether he continued to take Morell's medicine," Emmy told me. "But from that time on, he hated Brandt. When Brandt allowed his wife, the Red Cross nurse, to be captured by the Americans, Hitler had Brandt arrested. That's the Fuehrer's gratitude!"

Personal Physician Attempted To Poison Hitler As Madman

Hitler was extremely charming to me until the war began," she said. "Then he became correct but not exactly friendly. He never wanted me to meet Eva Braun. I and Winifred Wagner were the only women in our circle who never met Eva. Hitler evaded the issue whenever Hermann suggested that we meet. I never found out why."

There may be one neutral explanation. In 1935 Hitler had demanded that Goering marry Emmy, his mistress, on the ground that Nazi leaders must not lead immoral lives. It could be that when Hitler took Eva for himself he was sensitive about having the mistress he had made Goering marry meet the mistress Hitler did not marry. After the attack on Russia, Emmy told me, Hitler seemed to despise in humiliating Goering. This apparently arose out of the Marshal's protest, when he heard the news, that "Nobody can justify this step. To which Hitler replied coldly: 'I'll take the responsibility.'"

Goering often thought about the possibility of killing Hitler, his wife told me. "But how? And if he had done away with the Fuehrer and made peace with the Allies two years ago, those who were dissatisfied with that peace would have said that things would have been better if Hitler had lived. Furthermore, Hermann was too loyal to kill Hitler."

"Sometimes he thought of shooting himself, but he felt that would have been disloyal to the German nation. Frau Emmy is very bitter toward those Nazi leaders who committed suicide with the apparent exception of Goebbels. 'I think it was shameful that Hitler committed suicide,' she said. 'He had a sacred duty to hand himself over to the Allies, if only to take responsibility for what he did. The Fuehrer acted like a coward, betraying his friends and the whole German people by his suicide.'"
