OTTAWA MAN LEAVES 107 DESCENDANTS

OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—Leaving 107 descendants, all living in this district, Eusebe Charron died at his home here at the age of 96.

It was the first illness of his long life that removed Charron, one of the Capital's oldest inhabitants. He was stricken Christmas week and the doctor then called to his side was the first ever to attend him.

Offerings Small

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Jan. 13.—Indian buying orders coming into a market where offerings were small today, caused a sharp rise of 11-16 pence per ounce in the price of silver, which went to 13 7-8 pence. The welcome rise came at the end of a week which was marked by continued declines through Chinese selling, during which silver reached new low levels.

For The Cook

MAPLE FONDANT

Cook ten ounces of maple sugar, three tablespoons of water, one-fourth a teaspoonful of soda, and one-fourth a cup of heavy cream to 250 deg. Fah. Add one teaspoonful of butter and again cook to 236 deg. Work on the marble, as you would any fondant. It will take a much longer time to "come" than white fondant. If liked, the maple fondant may be mixed with white fondant, which makes it more delicate.

MAPLE GRACE

Cook twelve ounces of maple sugar, one-fourth a teaspoonful of soda, and five-eighths a cup of water to 170 deg. Fah. Set saucepan in a pan of hot water while dipping. Dip the balls into the glace, working very rapidly. Place on marble, when dipped.

MAPLE GLACE II

This glace is much easier to dip with than the former, though not so strong in flavor.

Cook six ounces, each, of white sugar and maple sugar, with one-eighth a teaspoonful of cream of tartar, and one-half a cup of water to 200 deg. Fah. Set saucepan into pan of hot water, and dip quickly.

RETIRE AT EIGHTY-FOUR

TORONTO, January 13.—An interesting career that included service in the Metropolitan Police of London, England, at one time personal bodyguard to the King and for the past twenty-five years a guardian of a local financial institution, is recalled by the retirement of George Cuddy, at the age of 84.

Thirty years ago, as Inspector George Cuddy, of the London Police Force, he retired, but after five years of inactivity decided to start anew and came to Canada. He is the eldest of a family of five boys, all of whom became constables. The youngest, Alfred, is the present Deputy Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police.

CANADA LEADS WORLD IN EXPORTS TO STATES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Imports of Canadian goods to the United States led those of any other country during November of last year, while Great Britain was the heaviest buyer of United States goods. It was announced here today.

Exports of Canadian goods during month were valued at \$7,279,162 compared with \$4,455,621 during the corresponding period of 1929. Exports of goods to Canada were worth \$41,958,174 as against \$38,917,139 in the same month of the previous year.

Exports to Great Britain were valued at \$31,933,367 compared with \$31,770,359 and imports from Great Britain \$15,289,283 as against \$24,662,672.
