BENNETT WILL CATCH OF FISH SEEK OPINIONS IN PROVINCE OF PROVINCES FOR OCTOBER

FARTIES IN AGREEMENT

Premier Bennett has always held the view that so long as the Colonial Laws Validity Act remains on the statute book of Great Britain, Canada has no equality of status, while the Liberals have long been committed to repeal of the Act.

The question of securing another mode of amending the constitution is regarded as a matter for consideration by appropriate Canadian authorities, these being the Dominion Parliament and the parties to the pact of Confederation.

It is considered doubtful if any government in power at Ottawa will undertake to amend the British North America Act without consulting the provinces, although such action has been taken on several occasions in the past. The various provincial legislatures will be asked to approve at their next sessions the proposal endorsed by the Imperial Conference to repeal the Colonial Laws Validity Act. The provinces will also be able to consider the legal anomaly that while the Colonial Law Validity Act no longer is to apply to the legislation of the Dominion Parliament which may be repugnant to the provisions of any Imperial Act it will still be applicable against Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia or any other province of the Dominion. According to legal experts in Canada, including Premier Bennett himself, that is the position the recommendation of the Conference of 1929 on the operation of Dominion legislation and merchant shipping legislation provides for.

Premier Bennett is expected back in Canada the first week of December and the matter will be taken up with the provinces without delay, according to information available here.
