The great annual Marathon foot race which takes place April 19th at Boston, is creating no little interest in sporting circles. In this connection it will be of interest to a large number of friends and acquaintances of R. J. McDonald, the well-known Marathon runner, of Antigonish, to know that he has entered this great struggle and will compete in this race under the colors of St. F. X. College, probably for the last time, as he intends to abandon public athletics altogether hereafter. There are about 65 entries, among whom are such well-known runners as Caffrey, Mellor, John Lardon, the Irishman, the Brignoll, Caffrey holds the record, and won this event in 1900—01. Brignoll was the victor in this race in 1899. R. J. McDonald won the Marathon race in 1898, when he broke the record by 13 mins. 10 seconds. The record was beaten by Caffrey in 1901. It will be remembered that it was in this race that McDonald was dragged after running 23 miles, and has never had a chance to meet Caffrey since that time. The race on April 19th will start at Ashland, Mass., and will finish in Boston.
