### STRIKE IN SPAIN IS COMING SOON

HENDAYE, Franco-Spanish Frontier, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—Plans have been completed for declaration of a revolutionary strike throughout Spain some time in the next two or three days, it was learned today on most reliable authority.

Syndicalists and Communists are attempting to persuade the Socialists to join them in the movement. Dissatisfied railway workers, according to one informant, will start the strike. They have long been contesting for higher wages. After their walkout the Syndicalists and other arch-enemies of the telephone company will start a nation-wide revolutionary strike in which it is declared, telephone centres will be attacked.

There are reports that the Monarchists have planned to take advantage of the situation later on the theory that the Government will be weakened by the work of suppressing disorder.

The telephone company has cautioned its offices throughout Spain, and it is expected to request protection from the Government.

## EXHIBITIONS

Hon. Mr. Weir then dealt with the problem of Exhibitions. Here again value has not always been received for the large sums of money expended in promoting agriculture. "I think that we as farmers do not appreciate the amount of work that is done by the city people in making exhibitions a success," he said. "When a mistake has been made in the programme of these exhibitions I say without hesitation that it is due to the farmers, not to the men in charge. I have all ways found exhibition management and directors willing to receive suggestions from farmers as to how to get the best results. The farmer is hesitant to put forward any suggestion, because they feel that the work of the management. That is a problem with which we are now in a position to make some progress."

The prime purpose of the Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown Mr. Weir pointed out, is to educate farmers as to what can be done in producing high quality of livestock grain, potatoes, etc. Secondly, it enables farmers who have ambitions to improve their stock along any of these lines to obtain such stock for breeding or raising purposes. "Therefore I suggest that your Exhibition Association should consult not only with officers of your provincial department but with some of the outstanding bona fide farmers of the Province and together draw up a picture of what they thought agriculture should be in the Province, say, in the next twenty five years, and form their prize list with that one purpose, so that it will act as an instrument to achieve that end and encourage people in that direction."

The speaker cited exhibitions of polished grain as an instance of what he meant. The winner of these contests sometimes does not know whether his grain is of one kind or not. The exhibition authorities will be asked to allow exhibits only of grains from fields that have been inspected and certified as to growth, and a sample representative of the average quality of the grain will be taken by the inspector for exhibition purposes. When the competition is finished the farmers know that the man who wins is growing grain that under average conditions is productive of the best quality, so far as can be determined by the exhibition here.

Another change recommended with respect to livestock exhibits. Some exhibitors have for years been winning prizes with a cow, a horse or gelding that may not even be physically sound. The aim of the exhibition should be to show the farmer who the best livestock breeders are. No animals outside of some of the dairy breeds should be shown over thirty months of age.

In conclusion the speaker again expressed his appreciation of the generous reception accorded to him during the short time he had been in the province.

Mr. J. W. Boulter, President of the Rotary Club, thanked the Provincial Government for enabling the Rotarians to sit into the luncheon and hear Mr. Weir's interesting remarks.

officials, but to breeders' organizations, exhibitions, and in fact to the whole army of people engaged in prompting agricultural interests. The idea was to get the fullest value out of the efforts of all concerned, at the least possible wastage of effort; and expense caused by duplication. This was made clear to the delegates on the first day of the conference. The result has been the working out of a successful scheme for concerted co-operation, especially between federal and provincial officials.

Instances of the successful working out of this system were given in connection with the livestock industry.
