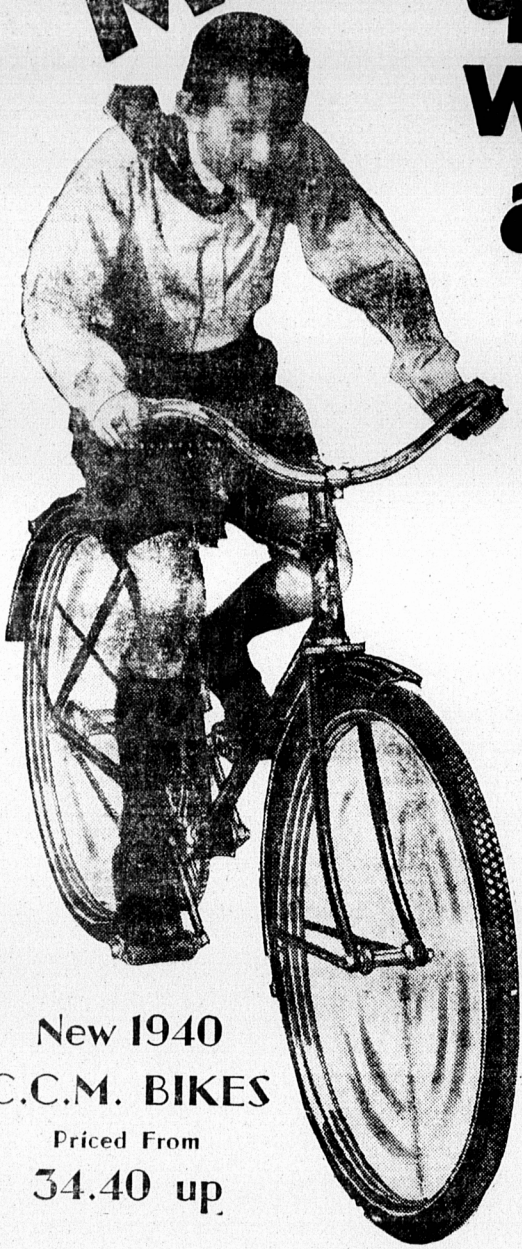

In Memoriam

WELLINGTON A. HOUSTON

There passed peacefully away at North Rustico on Friday evening June 7, 1946, Mr. Wellington Arthur Houston at the age of eighty-one years. Deceased was the last surviving member of the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Houston.

Although an invalid for nine years he was in his usual state of health until a few days previous to his death when pneumonia set in. During his long illness he was very patient, always looking on the brighter side of life and resting in the secure promise of a risen Lord.

He was a man of sterling character, respected by all who knew him and a member of New Glasgow Christian Church since early in manhood. He spent all of his life in Mayfield and North Rustico where he was one of the most progressive farmers. The district of Mayfield owes its name to Mr. Houston his being chosen from a long list of names while he served as School Secretary of that district. His devoted wife (nee Mary Eliza Woolner) predeceased him on April 17, 1938.
