GERMAN CLAIMS REGARDING SUBMARINE

(Canadian Press Despatch.) BERLIN, Oct. 4.—(Wireless to Sayville).—Thirty five vessels of countries at war with Germany with a total tonnage of 14,600 were sunk by German submarines in the North Sea or the English Channel between September 20 and September 29, it is officially announced. This is in addition to eleven British fishing steamers and four Belgian lighters, whose sinking already has been reported. Twenty-seven of the thirty five were fishing steamers. Thirty-one prisoners were brought in by the submarines.

STRIKERS SHOWERED TRAIN WITH BRICKS AND STONES

(Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Four passengers on elevated trains were injured today when sympathizers with the striking street railway men showered the train with bricks and stones from roof tops. In all six elevated trains and three cross-town surface cars were attacked. There were no arrests.

Too many hogs are brought to market poorly butchered and in many cases not properly cleaned and scalded which necessitates a lot of extra work in preparing the meats for market.

Farmers should remember that appearance as well as quality is important. Hogs when killed should be allowed to hang in a cool place for twenty-four hours before being brought to market. Attention to these matters will be to the mutual advantage of farmers and packers.

ZEPPELIN SPLIT IN TWO PIECES BEFORE REACHING THE EARTH

LONDON, October 4.—For the second time within a calendar month people at Potter's Bar have seen a Zeppelin brought down almost at their very doors. Just four weeks ago, a German airship came to ruin at Cuffley, which is only about three miles from Potter's Bar. This second visitation, therefore, was not so much a surprise at the first. A man living at Potter's Bar, who watched the coming of the raider from the north-east, gave the following account of its arrival:

"What struck me most about it was the evident uncertainty of the crew as to where they were or where they wanted to go. They stopped; they turned this way and that; they manoeuvred in every direction in order to avoid the searchlights which were darting about all around them—but all to no purpose. The way in which the great beams of light followed the airship, in all its desperate efforts to escape was really wonderful.

"A few moments afterward the gun began to shell the Zeppelin. They burst all around it, some of them so near that it seemed as though his had been scored. Then in a moment a bright light burst out of the body of the airship, and in another moment she was a mass of confusion in order to avoid the searchlights which were darting about all around them—but all to no purpose. 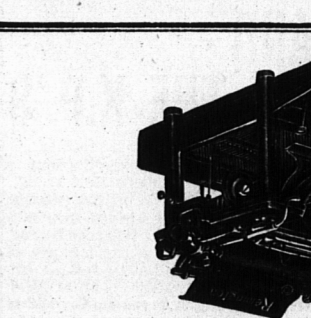

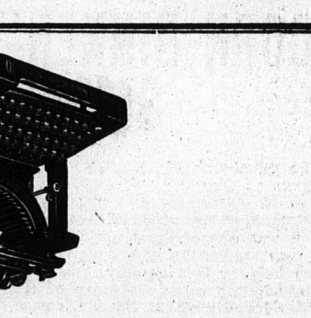
