CHAMBERLAIN QUIET ON WAR DEBT ISSUE

Chancellor of the Exchequer Refuses to Disclose What Policy Will Be Followed.

LONDON, June 4—(A.P.)—Although Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, declined again to give the House of Commons any inkling of the Government's policy upon the American War Debt, it was learned authoritatively that Cabinet Ministers expect a debt pronouncement from President Roosevelt before the next payment is due June 15.

This hopeful view is held by certain members despite the character of news reports from Washington, indicating there is little basis for it.

Mr. Chamberlain's reticence strengthened parliamentary opinion that he and his colleagues of the Cabinet are still expecting some move for solution of the question from the United States before the World Economic Conference opens June 12.

There is great difference of opinion in political quarters whether the installment of \$75,950,000 due June 15 should be paid or defaulted.

Voiding the general interest, Frederick S. Cocks, Labor member, asked Mr. Chamberlain whether the Cabinet had reached any decision on the debt question.

"It would not be desirable for me to make any statement in regard to this matter at present," the Chancellor replied.

Doctors Approve Of Sterilization

HAMILTON, June 4—Voluntary sterilization of mental defectives and drastic changes in regulations affecting the nursing profession were approved by the committee on general purposes of the Ontario Medical Association which met this afternoon in the Royal Connaught Hotel.

The committee is known as the "parliament" of the association and its session was the feature of the opening day's deliberations.

It was agreed that there should be a revision of nurses' hours and educational qualifications, and that applicants should be examined as to their physical fitness before being accepted.

Dr. J. H. Holbrook of Hamilton, president, presided at the opening session and several private committee meetings followed. More than 100 members had registered tonight, and an increased attendance is looked for to-morrow.

French Delegate To World Parley

PARIS, June 4—(A.P.)—Finance Minister Georges Bonnet and former Premier Joseph Caillaux together will head the French delegation to the World Economic Conference, with Premier Edouard Daladier presiding over the delegation the first few days. It was learned today on high authority.

M. Bonnet will be the Titular head but M. Caillaux, six times Minister of Finance and at present chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, will have a special title as a matter of dignity. As the Finance Minister will be obliged to return to Paris frequently, M. Caillaux will be the real active chief of the delegation.

Ukrainians Suffer From Hunger

WINNIPEG, June 4—A tale of suffering and starvation in the Ukraine, once a granary of the world, was told by Miss Sophie Susarenko, who passed through Winnipeg, bound for Edmonton, from her former home, Perekhivka, in the Soviet Ukraine. She is joining her husband, who came to Canada some five years ago.

"There is not enough bread or potatoes in Ukraine, let alone other bare necessities. Last year 800 people in my village died of starvation," Mrs. Susarenko said.

Food troubles in the Ukraine, she said, started in the fall of 1931, when the nationalization of agriculture was started on a large scale. Riots in her town had been quelled by armed force. Since then conditions have grown steadily worse. There were not enough cows to provide milk for the children and most of the horses had been eaten in the last two years by the starving people.

A crop failure is again anticipated this year. Failures are due principally to the unwillingness of the Ukrainian population to work collectively, and the lack of informed and skilled labor to handle modern farm machinery.

Workers in a sugar factory in the town are slightly better off than the agrarians, but even in the factory armed force is continued to maintain discipline. Criticism of the existing Soviet order, or any grumbling, is invariably followed by swift removal to the Slovetsky island, or to Archangel, from which there is no return.
