THE Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Church at a meeting on Friday at Halifax made a number of appointments of catechists for the coming summer, among whom was W. I. Green—Presbytery of P. E. Island.

On the opening of navigation the Steamers of the Black Diamond Line will begin their regular sailings between Montreal and Charlottetown, Sydney, North Sydney, and St. John's. The agents in Charlottetown are Peake Bros. & Co.

DURING the present week special evangelistic meetings will be held in Central Christian Church every evening (excepting Saturday) at 8 o'clock. On Monday evening, the pastor, Rev. Robert Pegrum, will deliver an address on "Soul-Winning."

NEW GLASGOW Division, Sons of Temperance will celebrate their annual anniversary by a social and entertainment in their Hall on Tuesday evening, April 3rd. A choice program has been prepared and a good time may be expected as this division has some of the best talent in the province.

ACCORDING to R. Harold Jenkins who returned Saturday from Sydney, business in produce is rather dull there at present. There are about 35,000 bushels potatoes in Sydney and some of the cargoes are opening up bad, owing to the mild winter. He was informed by produce dealers that the farmers of the Island require to change their seed more frequently in order to produce a finer and healthier potato. Last year the potatoes grown in sandy soil turned out better than those grown in the heavier soils.

THE dwelling house of Roderick Gillis, Little Sands with all its contents was destroyed by fire on Friday night. Mr. Gillis saved only the clothes he stood in. The loss will be about \$900 with no insurance. There was no one in the house at the time. Mr. Gillis had gone out half an hour before to a neighbor's house, and his nephew who lived with him was also away. The fire is supposed to have started upstairs in the flue. The neighbors had considerable difficulty in saving the outbuildings, and the clothing of the men caught fire a number of times.

THE Minto arrived at Georgetown at 10.10 Saturday. She brought over 100 pkgs. of way freight, 28 passengers and 76 bags of mail.

AN interesting and pleasant affair was the entertainment recently held at Barnaby O'Henleys, St. Peters in honor of several young friends who are about to depart for the North West. A very nice program was rendered and complimentary speeches made.

ANGUS D. MCKENZIE, a graduate of McGill College, Montreal has been engaged by the St. Andrew's Presbyterian congregation of Sydney as assistant to their pastor, Rev. A. W. Anderson. He will enter upon his duties about the first of May, and will probably be ordained to the ministry at once. Mr. McKenzie belongs to P. E. Island.

At a meeting of the Executive of the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association it was unanimously decided to hold the Show providing the several Provincial Governments of the Maritime Provinces and the Federal Government would give the necessary assistance, and the town of Amherst agreed to add eighty feet to the present Winter Fair buildings, the estimated cost being \$4,500. A provisional prize list has been drawn up which calls for the expenditure of \$2,700. The Governments have been asked to contribute according to the following scale: Nova Scotia \$800, New Brunswick \$800, and Prince Edward Island \$350. Application for the balance required will be made to the Dominion Government.
