A Woman's Best Judgment is Needed When She Learns That Her Husband is Straying From the Family Fireside - She Should Act Slowly

Dear Miss Dix—I have caught my husband making love to another woman. What attitude should I take? Should I act indifferent, say nothing to them but just leave their presence and act as if nothing had happened?



Answer: No woman ever confronts a more difficult and dangerous problem than does the wife who discovers her husband making love to another woman.

Reviewing the suggestions that she makes as to the different lines of conduct a wife might take who finds herself in this unfortunate predicament, I should say that whether or not the wife acted indifferently when she caught her husband making love to another woman, would depend on how seriously she thought he meant it.
