

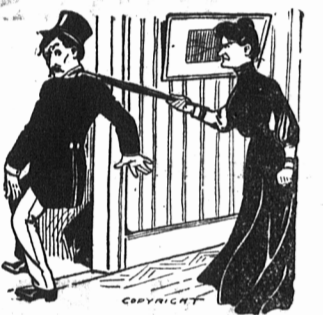

After a delicious supper had been served the company repaired to the parlor where many interesting games were introduced by Miss Rice, each one more amusing than the last. The games were pleasantly intermingled with music by the company, a reading and many amusing anecdotes by the pastor. And "As bees fly home with loads of treasure, the minutes wing'd their way with pleasure," until the hour of parting came when they all went to their homes after wishing Rev. and Mrs. Rice ad family a happy and prosperous new year.

MEMBERS of the Prince Edward Island Club gathered at Boston, Thursday evening at the Hotel Bellevue with President E. W. Doyle in the chair. After an elaborate dinner an informal social gathering was held, preceding the election of officers. The annual election resulted in choosing W. J. Smith as president, W. C. Grant, vice-president; Mrs. J. Dolron, secretary; Mrs. James Duffee, treasurer. For the executive committee three were appointed.
