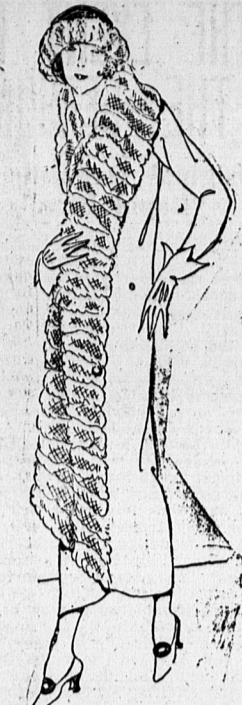

The little hat is of tan taffeta, banded about in matching fur. This can be worn late into the Spring.

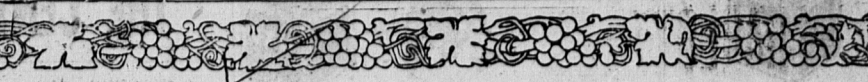
