NEW YORK, March 20—In the first speech of his campaign for the presidential nomination, Col. Roosevelt tonight contrasted his position with that taken by President Taft.

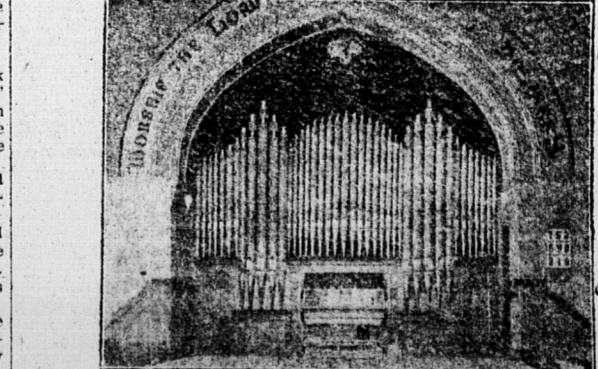
WORLD RIFLE RECORD FOR DEERING SCHOOL
