**Modern Jean Valjean Stirs Pity of France**

In the little commune of Puy-moyen in Charente, a tragedy has been enacted which now is calling for the sympathy of all France and has started a movement for a Presidential pardon for its chief actor or victim, writes a correspondent of the New York Herald Tribune. It is the case of a Modern Jean Valjean who is to-day on the same in the prison from which he finally escaped to lead a normal, industrious life and to win the esteem and confidence of his neighbors. The man's name is Honore Chantecaille. He came to the village in 1820, a man of fifty-five, to settle down and work as a laborer. Eventually he married and had two children, and his home and respected as a hard worker, despite his years. But he was never happy. All his friends realized that this taciturn but kindly man had some trouble which he could not forget. Then the day came when whatever it was that weighed upon his soul could be stood no longer. He went to the police and gave himself up as an escaped convict. At first the authorities would not believe his fantastic story of a theft committed when he was a boy, his sentence to hard labor, his attempts to escape, recapture and eventual safety. But his records proved his story. From prison he has written the following letter to his wife, which reveals a tragic life better than it could have been told by anyone else:

**Recaptured Several Times.**

"My dear Josephine—You ask me to tell you all my life. I want you to forgive me the pain that I shall cause you. Forty years ago I was condemned to five years' penal servitude for a foolish act of my youth. I have not killed anybody. I stole. I was twenty years of age when I left for the penal settlement in New Caledonia, where I served without incident, the slightest reproach. When I was relegated to Isles des Pins I managed to get work in the nickel mines, where I remained for four years when I escaped. I seized the opportunity of getting aboard an English sailing vessel, the Fernbank, of the Bank Line, which was lying out at sea. I worked on board as sailor, baker and cook. For over three years I led the life of a seafaring man. When the Fernbank reached Liverpool I felt that I must again see France. I had not seen my loved ones for over thirteen years. I was mad to think about it. Five months after I was recaptured. This time I was sent to Guyane. Twice I was recaptured in Dutch Guyane. The third time I was lucky, for I managed to reach Venezuela after ten days in the bush and fourteen days at sea.

**Horrible Suffering.**

"To regain my liberty I have undergone horrible suffering. At Coro-Estacion-Falcon the Venezuelan general, Augustin Faldar, entrusted me with the management of his agricultural property. I became a man of trust. I did my work to the entire satisfaction of my employer, but eight years later a doctor advised me to return to France. That was in 1909. I lived for fifteen months in the home of my parents, and during six of these months I worked at the Hachette Publishing House. A casual unintentional remark made by my mother—I bear her no ill feeling—was the cause of attracting attention to me. I was recognized and arrested again. It was already nine years since I made good my escape. I was condemned to six months in prison and deported to the convict settlement. On the voyage over I resolved to face every peril in order to get away from the prison, and within three weeks of my landing at Saint Jean du Maroni I succeeded in regaining Venezuelan territory, although it was far more difficult than the previous evasions.

**Lived An Honest Life.**

"I went back to my former employer. I found that he had been put in prison and his property confiscated as punishment for some political crime. Nevertheless as I had left a good record behind me at the plantation, my new employer trusted me with the same responsibilities that I had formerly held. I remained for ten years in the service of the same man, M. de Lima, planter, banker, Consul for Holland and Chile, at Coro-Estacion-Falcon, Luis Junado expressed friendship for me. On Armistice Day, 1918, he saluted me publicly, for I was the only French-

**Man in the Locality.** I had decorated an automobile with the colors of the Allies and had with me three four musicians, and we sang the 'Marseillaise' and the 'Venezuelan Hymn.' I waved a flag and waved from right to left, and cried 'Viva La France.' They threw flowers in my path and I felt my eyes filled with tears of joy.

**Ask Only Why.**

"In 1920, when I was fifty-five years of age, worn out, and old again, my thoughts turned to my country where I might and my days. You know the rest. We were married. I worked as temporary employe in several business houses and as workman with M. Bureau, who employed me until the day of my arrest. I had the consolation of my affection. That was sincere and very dear to me. I no longer hid my name. I lived under my own name at Angouleme. I believed myself saved. Then in a fit of fever I went and denounced myself to the police at Poitiers. I await being sent back to the convict prison. That is my life. I am not a bad husband nor a drunkard. I only have you and you are everything to me. I only ask one thing; let them have pity on me. I embrace you with my whole heart, my dear Josephine.

**Britain Rejected Sun Yat Sen Wish**

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The refusal by the British authorities in China to allow Sun Yat Sen, president of the Chinese Republic, to engage Canadian officers to train his troops was responsible for the entry of Soviet troops into Canton, to the great dismay of the British traders, states the special correspondent of the Morning Post in southern China.

This is not the first time that Canadians have been said to have played a prominent part in the destinies of China. Some years ago the report was broadcast that Morris A. Cohen, young soldier of fortune from Edmonton, had become the confidential advisor to Sun Yat Sen, after having acquired intimate acquaintance with Chinese characteristics while he was still in Canada, observing the Chinatown of Canton.

"This message of the Morning Post correspondent reads: 'With regard to the Russians, the position is this Sun Yat Sen wished to have foreign advisers and officers to train his troops. He had actually made arrangements for the engagement of some Canadian officers, but at the last moment the British authorities disallowed it. Borodin was in Canton at the time, and he promptly took advantage of the opportunity, and offered Russian instructors. The offer was accepted, and not only did he furnish officers for the training of raw troops, but also arms and ammunition. The troops that had been trained by the Russians, walked through their opponents' way which the Chinese had not believed to be possible.

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**RECIPROCAL TRADE WITHIN THE EMPIRE**

Premier Baldwin Says Matter Could be Discussed More Fully at Imperial Conference Than in Commons.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—J. S. Wardlaw Milne, Conservative M. P. for the Kidderminster division of Worcestershire, in the House of Commons today suggested that the Dominions should be invited to express their opinions as to the best methods of increasing reciprocal trading within the Empire and as to what measures for further Imperial preference they consider would be necessary to give effect to "this desirable improvement in trade," and thus assist emigration from Great Britain to the Dominions within the Empire.

Mr. Milne asked what steps the Government intended to take to put into operation the recommendations of the Imperial Economic Committee.

Premier Baldwin in reply expressed doubt as to the Kidderminster member's suggestion at this stage being best calculated to advance the development of trade within the Empire. In the Premier's opinion, the matter could be discussed more usefully at the Imperial Conference than in the House of Commons.

The Premier pointed out that notice had already been given of the introduction of the merchandise marks bill which was one of the recommendations of the Imperial committee. He said he hoped to make a statement at a later period with regard to the remaining recommendations of the Imperial Economic Committee.
