THE MOCK PARLIAMENT.

"Boys, don't play it—he it. Study, work on the problems suggested, and your Mock Parliament will mean development of citizenship, will mean expansion of your views, will mean an education along lines and just in the class that needs it."

These words, in substance if not verbatim, came from the lips of an old parliamentarian, a ripe scholar and one whose words are weighed, and whose good sense is twelve ounces to the pound—came, on being apprised that the success of bygone years had been revived. In those days no less a personage than a Judge of the Supreme Court honored the opening of the House in the capacity of Lieutenant Governor. No less exalted a personage than the present incumbent of the gubernatorial chair said to the writer, "A splendid idea. Be in earnest, fit yourselves for your positions, study, express yourselves in fitting diction, not unmindful that strength lies in reserved force."

The scribe (as scribes will) stretched urbanity to its Ultima Thule and said, "But will Your Honor give us your countenance?" "Merit it" came the reply, softened by a kindly smile that spoke volumes alike to the cabinet minister and opposition whip who were standing by.

On Monday our youth, and (let it not be told in Gath) those who can claim youth only in heart—for we find on both benches men who have sat in the civic councils, men high in military ranks, men of business whose position is unquestioned—we find these men conning fresh their procedure digests, data of their constituencies, widening their ken on public questions, matters not only interminable but international. Well might the sage say "Don't play it—he it," or our highest state officer say "Be in earnest."

There will be no voting on party lines—as party lines; it shall be what is best for the province, country or empire, and as that is manifest the government will stand or fall."

Prosperous Year Reported—The Congregation Increases Rev. Mr. Rattee's Salary by \$50.

The annual meeting of Princetown Presbyterian Congregation was held in the church on Tuesday, Jan 17th.

There was a large and representative attendance. Hon Peter McNutt, Chairman of the board of Managers, presided. On behalf of the Session reports were presented by Rev. E. J. Rattee. These brought out the fact that, notwithstanding some losses by removal and death the contributions to outside objects had been very large.

The report of the Ladies' Aid Society showed that for cushioning the church there had been an expenditure of \$300.00. The chairman presented the manager's report, which was in substance as follows:—

Receipts for salary \$913.00, leaving a balance of \$113.00 on hand. On motion of D. Preston McNutt, it was heartily agreed to grant \$50.00 of this to the pastor, as an addition to the salary of the past year.

General account and church roof \$208.86.

These various reports showed that the actual income during the year was larger than in 1903. In addition to the above mentioned vote to the salary, the congregation very kindly remembered their minister during the holiday season with generous and valuable gifts. These figures and facts testify that throughout the year, the congregation made progress.
