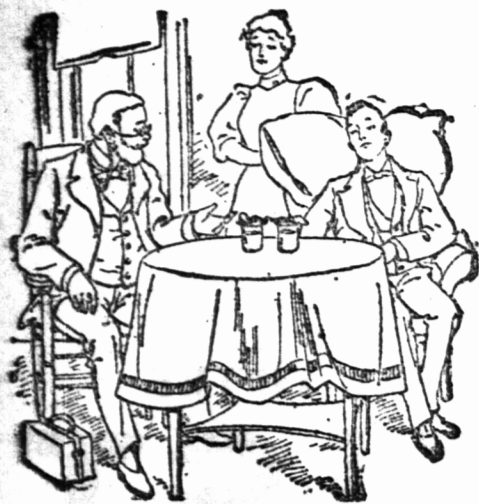

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Government of Quebec is engaged in a praiseworthy effort to get rid of the Legislative Council of that Province, which is a very costly and entirely useless body. Ontario started in after Confederation with but a single legislative chamber. Since that time New Brunswick, P. E. Island, Manitoba and British Columbia have abolished their irresponsible Upper Houses. Only in Quebec and Nova Scotia are Legislative Councils retained and in both cases these exist in defiance of public sentiment as expressed in the popular branches of the Legislatures in those provinces. It is only a matter of time when the popular will must have its way in Quebec and Nova Scotia.

Rev. Robert B. Douglas, Presbyterian minister at Johannesburg, speaking of the current impression that the Boer soldiers are much more pious than the British, says:

To one who knows the modern young Transvaaler nothing is more marvellous than the persistence with which their piety and soberness are spoken of. If Dr. Watson had heard these drunken youths yelling, "God damn the Queen," and shouting obscene allusions to Her Majesty to trainloads of British men and women, his views of the spiritual state of the armies would be different. And if he had walked through the hospital at Wynberg, as I have done, he would have found Scottish soldiers, brave, hardy, and clean-living, who would have afforded a happier suggestion of the Puritan than all the armies of the Transvaal can supply.

The Examiner, referring to the rumored probability of Premier Emmerson of New Brunswick being appointed to a Judgeship says sarcastically that in that case "another clean man will be provided for." The writer of this paragraph has known Mr. Emmerson for many years and has always regarded him as one of the better class of public men as he certainly is among the most competent. Before the last provincial election in New Brunswick some charges of mal-administration in connection with bridge contracts were made against him. These charges were so far disproved and utterly discredited that the Opposition barely secured the return of five members in a House of forty six. We know of no other charges ever made against Mr. Emmerson since he has been in public life. The spirit of the Examiner's insinuation is, under the circumstances most reprehensible.

The famous Dr. Livingstone, African explorer and missionary, whose name is revered in every Christian land, in his Missionary Travels expresses in the strongest way his sense of the cruelty of the Boers of the Transvaal toward the native races. The following is a brief extract, and many such might be quoted: The tribes who still retain the semblance of independence are forced to perform all the labor of the fields, such as manuring the land, weeding, reaping, building, making dams and canals, and at the same time to support themselves. I have myself been an eye-witness of Boers coming to a village, and according to their usual custom, demanding twenty or thirty women to weed their gardens, and have seen these women proceed to the scene of unrequited toil, carrying their own food on their heads, their children on their backs, and instruments of labor on their shoulders. Nor have the Boers any wish to conceal the meanness of thus employing unpaid labor; on the contrary, every one of them, from Mr. Potgeiter and Mr. Gert Kruger, the commandants, downwards, lauded his own humanity and justice in making such an equitable regulation. "We make the people work for us in consideration of allowing them to live in our country."

It is related that a schoolboy when asked by his teacher whether the sun revolved around the earth or the earth revolved around the sun, and being in doubt, replied, "Sometimes one and sometimes t'other." The esteemed editor of the Patriot seems to labor under the same sort of doubt about the Modder river, which he says "runs east and west, but

its course is a little inclined to the north-east and southwest." Only the most erratic sort of a river would "run about" in that fashion. "On the east and west end, the British forces are located," says the Patriot. As the river is about 150 miles in length, it is easy to see that the British forces thus located would be well out of range of Cronje's guns. None the less "Roberts, in a fine use of his strategic ability, is shelling the force with his artillery." All of which goes to bring about the present state of affairs in which the illiterate and illiterate Cronje is now "facing three facts--stermination, starvation, or surrender." This is entirely an original view of the war situation.

President George E. Hughes of the Charlottetown Board of Trade telegraphed Sir Louis H. Davies, yesterday urging the necessity of having the S. S. Stanley placed on the Pictou Charlottetown route, at once. A reply was received from Sir Louis to the effect that he had wired Capt. Finlayson asking for information concerning the condition of the Straits. It is greatly to be desired that the Stanley should be secured for this service and we trust that it may be found practicable to carry out the wishes of local shippers.

The members of the Provincial Government met with about 50 leading citizens in the Legislative Council Chamber yesterday to discuss the site of the proposed Hillsboro bridge. Those present were largely in favor of having the bridge as nearly in front of the city as possible. It was pointed out that the cost of the bridge if built at Kensington would be much less. On motion of Mr. Hughes, seconded by Mr. Walter Matheson a resolution was passed requesting the Government to lay before the Board of Trade plans and specifications of the bridge and full in-
