JAPAN KEEPS CLOSE WATCH

PEKIN, Oct 20—Japan has taken official cognizance of the reported efforts of British and American interests to arrange with China to build the Kinchow-Tsishar railway, as it is considered that the proposed construction of this road has grown out of the defeat of the plan to build the Hsinmintun-Fakumen railroad. Japan has formerly notified China that while it does not intend to obstruct the government, yet it will maintain its right to be consulted with respect to Manchurian railways. Though Japan does not claim the right to veto, it reserves decision with regard to subsequent action. Recent events in connection with the recall to Washington of Charles R. Crane, the American minister designate to China, precipitated Japan's action. It is understood that the action of the American Secretary of State followed Japan's solicitations, not only on account of Mr Crane's alleged utterances, but because of American commercial activities in Manchuria under a former American official, whom the Japanese regarded as exceedingly active in the anti-Japanese movement in Manchuria following the war. The Japanese appear to be alarmed at the American activities, which seem to bear the stamp of governmental direction. The Chinese government defends the textual Manchurian government, but it is admitted that China would welcome outside support.

AGRICULTURAL TRAINING IN RURAL SCHOOLS.

DANVILLE, Oct. 20—his address before the National Educational Association here, Prof James W. Robertson pointed out that the purpose of education in rural schools is not primarily to make a bigger ester or a bigger ear of corn, but to make a better home for a better child and this will not be accomplished by training for culture, the kind of culture properly defined by the words leisure, indolence, idleness, but through the refining influence of labour, labor which gives the boy a thrill as he looks upon his work, sees that it is well done, and realizes that he has done it. The problem of relating the country school more closely to the life and needs of the people received very grave consideration from the Association and should be considered by every intelligent lover of his country.

LIBERALS WIN PERTH ELECTION

ANDOVER, N. B., Oct 20—The Liberals won a distinct victory in the councillors' election for the parish of Perth today, Alexander Dionne and J. W. Niles being victorious over E. W. Larlee and G. B. Morehouse. The votes stood as follows: Niles, 178; Dionne, 159; Morehouse, 124; Larlee, 124.

In the parish of Andover, James Howard and James Porter, Conservatives, were elected with 68 and 67 votes respectively. Frank Henderson, Liberal, received 61 votes, notwithstanding the fact that he had not canvassed at all. The liquor case against Bernice Green, which was to have been tried today was postponed on account of the arrest which took place on Saturday of Spotters Roy Kennedy and Charles Cranfield, charged with perjury. Their examination will take place tomorrow before Magistrate Williamson. W. P. Jones, of Woodstock, will defend the "spotters" and T. J. Sarter will prosecute.

GERMAN EMPEROR'S DIAMOND FIELDS

NEW YORK, Oct 20—The American prints the following from Berlin: The Kaiser's dream of rivalling Sam Barnato as a diamond king has cost him, at the lowest estimate, \$75,000 in precious stones. In addition, the swindling engineer, who fooled the German authorities, in the African colonies discovered new diamond fields, the location of which he refuses to reveal. Of the large quantity of sparklers fraudulently abstracted from the imperial diamond fields at Luderitz-bucht by George Heim, chemist and engineer, barely \$6,000 worth have been recovered. The authorities investigating the theft are convinced a large part of the stolen diamonds were sold in America.

ESTRADE HOLDS ATLANTIC COAST

WASHINGTON, Oct 20—A note from Juan J. Estrade, the leader of the revolutionary movement in Nicaragua, announced to the Secretary of State today that he holds the Atlantic coast from Greytown to Cape Gracias a Dios and has assumed the provisional Presidency of the republic. He asked recognition. To this note the State Department has made no reply, it being contrary to precedent to communicate with revolutionary leaders. Although the State Department assumes a non-committal attitude, it is practically certain that the Estrada Government will be recognized as soon as the conditions mentioned in the official statement have been fulfilled. President Zelaya for a long time has been a thorn in the side of American diplomacy, which is seeking to bring order out of the chaos in Central America and in the circumstances his downfall would be the occasion of very little regret in Washington.

RUSSIAN EMPEROR AVOIDS BAVARIA

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 20—An important and unexpected change of itinerary on the eve of Emperor Nicholas' departure for Italy was made known to the foreign diplomats today. It is understood that the change was due in part to recent criticism of the Emperor in the Bavarian Landtag, but as well to other and deeper reasons, which, according to the best information obtainable here, resulted in the Emperor's decision to avoid Bavaria and Switzerland altogether and make a long circuit through eastern France to reach his destination. A meeting be-

tween the Emperor and the President of France during the trip is possible, though nothing official on this point can be obtained.

ANOTHER BATTLESHIP FOR GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, October 20—It is stated unofficially that the construction of a battleship cruiser will be begun at Devonport in November. The vessel will have engines of 70,000 horsepower, which is 4,000 horse-power greater than the engines of the Mauritania develop, and she will be capable of making thirty knots an hour at top speed. This, says the 'Standard,' means the revolutionizing of warship design, and will practically make obsolete as first class cruisers such vessels as the 'Good Hope' and 'Devonshire,' which could be overtaken and blown to pieces before they could get in range themselves.

ST. JOHN-NAPLES LINER LAUNCHED

MONTREAL, Oct 20—Messrs Reford received a cable from Newcastle yesterday stating that the new steamer Torton, built for the Canadian Mediterranean passenger trade, has made her trial trip on the Type, making an average speed of fifteen knots. The Torton makes a voyage to Montreal this year and during the winter will ply between St. John and Naples and Genoa.
