Transportation Committee Report

The following report of the transportation committee was submitted at the recent annual meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade by the chairman, Mr. J. LeRoy Holman:

The most important work of your committee during the year was the preparation and presentation of the Board's case for lower car ferry truck rates on the Borden-Tormentine route. This was argued before the Board of Transport Commissioners, which hearing was held in the Law Courts Building in Charlottetown on July 17th and 18th. Your Board was very ably represented by Mr. Rand Matheson, Moncton, Manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission, and Chief Commissioner J.A. Cross, K.C., presided at the hearing. Associated with him being Commissioner Sylvester and G.A. Storr, representing the Canadian National Railways were Messrs. A. K. Dymari, Montreal legal counsel, L. K. Knox, commission traffic representative, E. B. Robb, general freight agent, Moncton, A. S. Guay, engineer, and Messrs. C. T. Montgometry, superintendent, and A. A. Lesnar, Div. Frt. & Pass agent. The Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, was represented by Capt. J.A. Hensman, O.B.E. Among the island witnesses were: Hon. Horace Wright, T. J. Inman, J. LeRoy Holman, T. Earle Hickey, G. F. Currier, Keith MacKinnon, Ralph Jenkins, Senator John E. Sinclair, Mr. B. Graham Rogers co-operated in a very generous manner in securing evidence and valuable facts.

Mr. Rand Matheson handled the case for the Summerside Board in a very able, practical and capable manner in securing material for his very comprehensive brief, he had the support of your Board's members and island representatives from different sections of the province. Your Board, previous to the hearing, invited members of the Provincial Government of the Charlottetown and other members of Trade and of all interested in the subject matter, to meet and confer with Mr. Matheson at a meeting of your Board held in July. At this meeting Mr. Matheson went thoroughly into the whole subject matter and later spent some little time in Summerside with other members in finalizing the definite details of his brief. Your committee wishes to especially register its appreciation for the most valuable assistance rendered by Senator Sinclair while in Ottawa, as well as at the hearing in Summerside, where he was a very valuable witness.

Reasons For Action

In our endeavour to have the strongest possible case presented before the Board of Railway Commissioners, we were met by the views expressed by members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and others that it was a matter that should be dealt with between the Federal and Provincial Governments. However, the secretary of the Board of Transport Commissioners definitely stated that the case should be presented to the Board. The Summerside Board considered that in engaging Mr. Matheson, in the full and complete preparation of all the factors involved and in bringing the case before the Board of Transport Commissioners, it was dealing with the important matter in a very practical manner and that if it were found that proper redress was received, as a result of the hearing, the move taken would be all to the good.

On the other hand, if the decision was unfavorable, your Board felt there would be nothing lost, but that the case would be brought before the Board of Transport Commissioners, the experience gained and that in any event, the move would be all to the good.

Darnley Hands Kensington 7-5 Defeat

The first period was a thriller with Darnley gaining the first few minutes of play. W. Woodside came close to scoring when he hit the goal post. Then New Annapolis took a spell of raiding the Darnley end and were rewarded at the eleven minute mark when Francis MacKay backhanded a shot past Champion from a scramble. Two minutes later "The Rocket" Chubby Mill made it two, beating Champion on a beautiful wing shot assisted by C. Mill and A. Mill. Darnley came roaring back and Thompson on a beautiful solo effort beat McInnis from outside the crease. Three minutes later Geo. Wall made it two-all when he scored a goal from the left side of the net, beating Champion. After two minutes of the second period was gone W.
