A HALIFAX despatch of the 25th says: The city has another sensational suicide. The dead body of an unknown man was found in the woods near Taft's Cove, Dartmouth, on Saturday evening, with a bullet in his brain. The suicide is a man between 40 and 45 years, about 5 feet, 6 inches tall, hair light brown, and mustache sandy. The top of his head is bald, and the face considerably freckled. On the right arm are several Indian ink marks, the letters "J. B." being plainly visible, with two flags on either side, and a floral emblem surrounding the whole. The boots are covered with red mud, similar to Island soil. Fierce gales raged all night on this and the American coasts. Several wrecks are reported about New York.
