EASTERN NOTES.—Hog shipping has come and gone with a regrettable amount of dissatisfaction. That the company have expended, are expending, much money is certain, that they want fair returns from capital invested is reasonable, that they have been imposed in by fish fed hogs, imperiling their business standing is true, that they have been loaded more than once with well stuffed hogs, the experience of Capt. Read, proves, that that they have sometimes been compelled to refuse hogs, unfit for the business to unreasonable farmers, all know; but our farmers, the great majority of whom wish to deal fairly, complain that at this particular time they could not find any responsible agent of the company to give them prices till the morning of shipment when they could either leave them at the price, or haul them home again, and for that reason many of them never left home. They complain likewise that the scale prices is continually changing. At one shipment, a certain weight between two figures brings the highest price, next shipment the farmer tries to have his hogs all that weight when he finds that some other weight this time is higher, when he nearly gives up the matter in disgust. Another complaint is, that when he gets his ticket he may have to go to some market to get it cashed, who is glad of the opportunity to demand his own bill long over due, while the farmer was intending to take up the note in the bank for the buggy or harrow which some city to good agent forced on him some of the past seasons. That it may be hard for the Co. to give prices many days beforehand on a fluctuating market is certain, that different weights may suit the varied requirements is true, but it is hard for the average farmer to understand this, when dollars and cents, when his very existence as a successful farmer are at stake.

The rain fall has recently been excessive and unusual, and as a consequence the roads are terribly cut up and bridges damaged. Certainly some will blame the Government but wherever they may be their sins and short-comings, thought to them will probably ever be canonized as political saints, they should not be to blame for the coming of an all-wise Providence. The schooner Miana M. Cook added another lot yesterday to the quantity of P. E. Island produce now in the city. The tons brought in 2327 bushels of potatoes, 330 bushels of turnips, 1,500 bushels of oats and 67 bushels of oysters.—Halifax Herald.

The little girl Jennie Covey, arrested some days ago for assaulting with a brick a boy who tried to prevent her from putting kittens in a fire was discharged yesterday as sufficiently punished. It is understood she is to be sent to P. E. Island.—Halifax Chronicle.

The schooner Evantide arrived here Monday from Sydney with a cargo of coal for E. K. O'Call. She left Sydney on Nov. 25th, but escaped the storm of 7th. She arrived at Summerside on Monday the 16th but was afraid to enter and put back to P. E. I. She arrived again Saturday and was towed to Chatham. She will load lumber at Sincalra and sail to Sydney if possible.—Newcastle Advocate.
