NO MORE SOCCER IN ENGLAND TILL WAR IS FINISHED.

LONDON, April 20—The English Football Association has announced that with the close of the present season on May 5, no more professional football games will be played until after the war is ended. It was necessary to finish the present season, even at a heavy loss, the secretary of the association explained, "because of the existing contracts for players, grounds and other things which involved an expenditure of \$4,000,000. None of these contracts have been renewed for next year. At the outbreak of the war there was much opposition to the football association, and the football league carrying out their schedule for this season, which began in November. It was determined by the football governing bodies, however, to adhere to their programme, but at the same time to give every facility to the war effort in the work of recruiting for Lord Kitchener's army. Many of the players rather than play joined the army. There was some talk of asking Parliament to suppress professional football during the war, but Premier Asquith declared that the situation did not warrant such legislation.

LONDON, April 19—"There will be no association football, cup ties, or league matches after this season," said F. J. Wall, secretary of the Football Association, today. This decision was not unexpected. A continuous outcry has been going on since the beginning of the war declaring it scandalous that the pick of Britain's athletes should play football instead of joining the army. Amateur football practically stopped when the war commenced but the professionals who number nearly 5,000 continued as usual. Secretary Wall explained this today as follows: "It was impossible to stop the game at the beginning of the season because contracts had been signed with the players, landlords and contractors amounting to three-quarters of a million pounds and these had to be fulfilled. No fresh contracts will be made. We hope the players will join the army."

LONDON, April 19—The Middleborough-Oldham match of April 3rd, which resulted in a victory for the former by the score of 4 to 1, stands as a completed match, according to the decision of the League today. Cook, of Oldham, who refused to leave the field, was suspended.

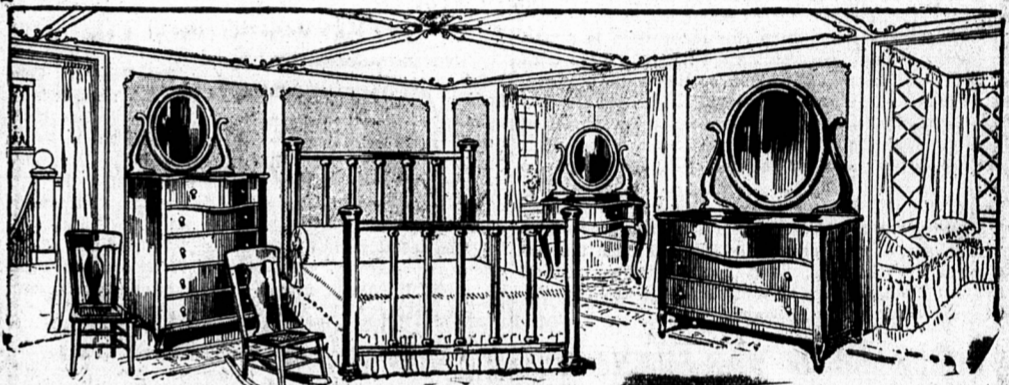
