DRY CELLS PROVE UNSATISFACTORY

C. F. S. writes: The magnetos of my Ford is so poor that I have to use dry cells for its ignition and, as I use them on my stationary engine as well, it takes a great many of them and they do not last long. Can I use any of the material of old cells to make new ones? Do dry cells have to be charged by a dynamo?

Answer: When a dry cell is exhausted, there is nothing left that can be utilized to make new ones with. It would not pay you to try to make cells. Dry cells do not have to be charged by a dynamo, as the zinc, carbon and chemicals used in them furnish the current. You better have your Ford magnetos repaired by having the magnetos recharged or replaced, the coils inspected, the clearance between magnetos and coils checked up and the contact spring cleaned. It would also pay you in the end to get a magneto or a generator for your stationary engine.

TWO CYLINDERS WEAK WHEN IDLING

E. A. J. writes: When I idle my engine and cut out the ignition of the cylinders with a screw driver, it makes no difference in the speed when the plugs in Nos. 2 and 3 are short-circuited. When the pet-cocks are open, these two cylinders do not fire as strongly as the other two. Do you think that this weakness is caused by leakage past the rings, which I had changed some time since? The compression in all cylinders, is practically the same, when tested by the hand crank.

Answer: If two of the cylinders acted weak when the car was on the road, causing irregular action, we should suspect faulty ring action, but you do not mention this. So far as irregularity in action when idling is concerned, this is more likely due to the fact that all cylinders do not receive equally strong charges, either on account of faulty distribution by the manifold or because there are air leaks on the inlet side of the two weak cylinders. If you wish to test the effectiveness of the rings in main- taining compression, you can do so by using a compression gauge. This should be connected into the spark plug hole of a cylinder and the engine run on one cylinder. After reading the pressure, the gauge can be moved to the other cylinders successively and their readings taken.

DISTRIBUTOR IGNITION FOR FORDS.

J. M. asks: Is there any ignition outfit on the market suitable for a Ford which does away with the timer and vibrator and has a distributor such as used on big cars? Is it possible to get an outfit like this that will run from the Ford magnetos?

Answer: A number of the makers of single coil distributor battery ignition systems make special adaptations that can be readily installed upon the Ford car. In general, these are intended to run on storage battery current, but one outfit, recently brought out, is claimed to operate on the Ford magnetos current. Your supply dealer can furnish you information upon the subject.

Ottawa Scored Third Victory Over St. Patrick's

TORONTO, Jan. 17.—Ottawa Senators scored their third straight victory over St. Patricks here Saturday night 5-2 score and incidentally secured a strangle hold on the championship for the first half of the series. Ottawa was by far the superior team and it is only to be wondered at that they did not win by a larger margin. The St. Patrick's outfit appeared to best advantage in the first period, when they restricted Ottawa to two tallies while managing to score one themselves. In the second and third periods Ottawa was the best and it is a safe bet that if they maintain the same excellent form in future games they will easily maintain their present status of champions of the world.

In the first period the Ottawas adopted the five-men system and continued it throughout. It was thought, that the acquisition of Stewart, the Amherst, N. S. player would bolster up the weak spots in the St. Patrick's defence system but it was not noticeable in the game with Ottawa. Stewart is a fair stickhandler, but is hardly speedy enough for the professional game. However, this may be accounted for by reason of his lack of practice to date. In the second period Stewart was relieved on the defence by Noble.

Canadians, 6; Hamilton Tigers, 4.

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—Registering their second victory of the season, Canadiens on Saturday night gave further evidences of a return to their best form by defeating Hamilton Tigers 6 to 4 at Mount Royal Arena before a crowd of about 3,000 persons.

Canadians finished in whirlwind style outlasting the visitors in a sparkling third period. The match set a record for clean play there being only one penalty imposed when in the last moments of the game Harry Mummery, of Canadians, was given a three minutes penalty for tripping Carey.
