FATAL RIOTING OVER BIG PROCESSION

Mexican Law Forbid Church Parades, but People Resented Its Enforcement. Mob Burned Mayor's House. Village Priest is Dying of Self-Inflicted Wounds.

MEXICO CITY, April 15—(Special)—The rioting which occurred at Velardena mining camp on Saturday was more serious than was first reported, thirty-two men being killed, and many injured.

The trouble it is alleged, was instigated by Father Valenzuela, parish priest, who now lies between life and death.

The police fired on the mob, many numbers of which were well armed. The officers were forced to retreat, leaving six dead in the main street.

UNITED STATES COAL FOR EUROPE

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 14—The Pittsburg Coal and Ore Company, which in the past week has been incorporated through the laws of West Virginia, today brings to light the fact that Pittsburg coal to the amount of perhaps 20,000,000 tons has been contracted for by Southern Europe, and that the coal which usually went to the Northwest will be shipped abroad at figures more advantageous than those given by American markets.

MACHIASPORT, April 15—The two-masted schooner Mary E., St. John, for Hingham, with spruce plank was dragged ashore in Marchias Bay and will be a total loss. The crew are safe. The schooner was 19 years old and 98 net tonnage.

FORT WORTH FIRE SWEEPED
