INWARD TRAINS.—The eastern express arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 9.30 a. m., on time, the southern accommodation at 10.25 a. m., fifty-five minutes late, and the Cape Traverse accommodation at 10.10 a. m., fifteen minutes late.

NORTHUMBERLAND ARRIVES.—Yesterday the Northumberland arrived in Picton from Charlottetown at 11.10 a. m. She left again about 3.30 p. m., with passengers, express, mail and freight and arrived at 7.25 p. m. She leaves today at 7.30 a. m.

RETURNED FROM SAD ERRAND.—H. C. Burchell of Sydney, brother of Captain Burchell of the missing steamer Morien, passed through Gloucester Bay last evening on his way from Louisburg. For nearly two weeks Mr. Burchell has been aboard the government steamer Lady Laurier, which has been searching for the Morien—Gloucester Bay Exc. The second engineer of the Morien was formerly a Charlottetonian.

ROAD RACE.—Word was received at The Herald office Saturday that Fred Cameron, the Amherst crack, who meets Hans Holmer here to-morrow night, is entered for the big Arthur Duffy race in Boston on December 15th. Speaking with the writer in Amherst the other night, Fred intimated that he would compete in this classic. Sounded on the possibilities of his taking in the Powderhall Marathon again, he was not so emphatic.—Halifax Exc. Cameron has many friends in Charlottetown.

HAS TUBBER CARGO.—After a stay of a month in this, her home port, the new Plant line Evangeline sailed for Havana Saturday laden with 10,000 barrels of potatoes. From the Cuban capital she will enter the Florida-Panama tourist passenger traffic for the winter months, returning next spring with the Halifax and A. W. Perry for the regular summer and autumn runs between Boston, Halifax, Port Hawkesbury and Charlottetown. The Halifax is now loading at the Plant line wharf for her departure to Cuba on December 16th.—Halifax Exc.

AMBULANCE CALL.—The ambulance was called out at seven yesterday morning to remove to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, a man suffering from self inflicted wounds. Despondency said to be due to domestic troubles brought on the state of mind, which resulted as above. Though the wounds are severe the doctors say that there is no reason why he should not recover. Under the circumstances, it has been deemed advisable not to give the details of this sad and regrettable affair.

INSPECTOR HERE.—T. R. Ferguson, Dominion Steamboat Inspector, is in Charlottetown from Quebec, to inspect the winter steamers which are now undergoing repairs here. He is accompanied by his brother, John J. Ferguson, of Glasgow, Scotland. All the Ferguson brothers are engineers and the latter has been almost all round the world in various steamers. He left the sea some years ago and is now in business as a member of the firm of Ferguson and Timpon, Ltd., who carry on a very extensive engineering works at Govan, near Glasgow.

HAY RECEIVED.—By the Stephen came 1,000 bales of hay from Halifax and by the Cape Breton 1,800 from Charlottetown. These shipments, with what will be brought along by the Cacouna, Louisburg, Sydney and Miramichi, during the next month from P. E. Island, will help to offset the shortage in the local crop. The Agricultural societies of St. John's, Conception Bay, and elsewhere throughout the Island are importing quantities on their own account and these will be sent to them as quickly as possible.—St. John's Chronicle.

COUNCIL MEET.—At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held in the council chambers, Charlottetown, last night Councillor Taylor occupied the chair in the absence of Mayor Lyons. The report of the city surveyor was submitted, showing the extent and cost of sidewalks, which amounted to \$5,373. Councillor Walker asked what had been done in the matter of the proposed purchase of land from Joseph McAleer, of Highland Avenue. Councillors McNevin and Taylor replied that no action had been taken as the owner wanted too much money for it. The council then ordered that tenders be called for printing the city reports.

Last Sunday being Educational Sunday they both preached in the Methodist Churches in Charlottetown, morning and evening. In the First Methodist Church, in the morning, Rev. Dr. Borden preached an exceptionally able sermon from the text "Ye shall know the truth and the truth will make you free. In the evening Rev. Dr. Campbell took for his subject the one word, Vision, preaching one of his always forceful and eloquent sermons. There were large audiences present on both occasions.

REDMOND ANNOYED BY SUFFRAGETTES. LONDON, Dec. 7.—Suffragettes put John Redmond to the torment of the Irish National party, to the torment this afternoon, at a home rule demonstration at Dalston in the northeast of London. For half an hour the Irish leader watched the forcible eviction from the hall of his disturbers, whose interruptions and desperate resistance to the ushers caused a rapid succession of rough and tumble scenes of the most rowdy description. Men as well as women were thrown bodily out of the hall. Among the men were some clergymen who had protested against the rough handling of the women.

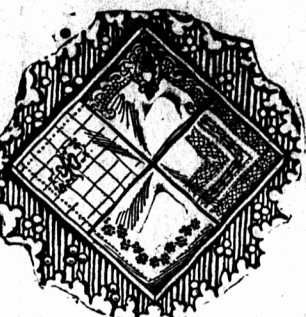
