Notes By The Way

Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, started something when in his annual report just out he stated that "the immigration efforts made in the past might be termed spasmodic and unorganized."

Of course, the words "spasmodic and unorganized" would be mild indeed if applied to immigration affairs in Prince Edward Island since the King Government came into power.

It is an unprecedented condition in our public affairs when high officials in their annual reports criticize and reflect upon the action of the ministers who appointed them and it is equally beyond precedent when ministers accept in silence the expressed or implied censure of their subordinates in office.

Hon. Mr. Rand, Attorney General in the Veniot Government, created a sensation when he made his maiden speech the other day in the Legislature at Fredericton, N. B.

Mr. Rand further asserted that many other Maritime claims were untenable and that "the delegation which recently went to Ottawa to press the claims of the Maritime Provinces made itself ridiculous. They didn't know what they went after and didn't know when they got there what they wanted," he said.

The relations between the Veniot Government at Fredericton and the King Government at Ottawa were so close and intimate that they may be said to sleep together.

By its action the King Government is saying from day to day that two Senators are enough for Prince Edward Island and the Constitutional Act is violated to keep it so while Parliament is sitting.

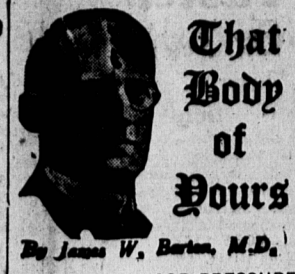

ABOUT LOW BLOOD PRESSURE

Some time ago I wrote about the importance of low blood pressure, because everybody seems to be stressing the matter of high blood pressure.

However, if you were to talk to your family doctor, he would tell you that in treating any ordinary case of illness, he would rather have the blood pressure above than below normal.

Although there are a number of things that may affect blood pressure, on research men are now of the opinion that the nervous system is the big factor.

The treatment is obvious. As low pressure is just a sign of general weakness, of lowered nerve tone, the building up of the body as a whole is the first thought.
