**Demands For Long Credit Hamper Trade With Russian**

(Associated Press)  
STOCKHOLM, July 31.—Requests from Russia for long credit in Sweden, in some cases for periods of three to four years; slow business procedure and severe maintenance of the Soviet foreign trade monopoly, combined with almost insurmountable difficulties in the way of private Russian enterprise, are some of the things encountered by Swedish exporters dealing with Russia under the new trade agreement between the two countries, according to a statement given out by the Swedish General Export Association.  
Since the exchange of ratifications of the treaty May 1 the deals closed have totalled not more than about \$500,000, involving purchases of such Swedish products as paper, pulp, cream separators, steel plates, and agricultural machinery. Although the Russians have in certain cases asked for three or four years' postponement of payments no credit of more than six months has so far been granted. The procedure is slow because all negotiations and orders must come through the Russian Trade Delegation in Stockholm, and this body must obtain competitive bids, not only from Swedish firms, but also from abroad.  
While private enterprise is permitted in Russia, the Soviet is itself in competition with such business and the individuals and private firms find their activity severely hampered and heavily burdened with taxes. Swedish firms, therefore, do not at present look for much business with Russia except through the monopoly

**MORE TRUTH THAN FICTION**

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 4.—The reported discovery of huge menlike apes in the mountains of Washington state, which are said by Indians to be members of a strange, hitherto unknown tribe of natives called the Neathiks, brings to mind the fact that Mr. Michael King, British Columbia timber cruiser, amazed the people of this province twenty years ago by returning from the woods of Vancouver Island with an astonishing tale of an uncouth creature, met in the woods, that was not man although it wore man's shape.  
Mr. King's story was scoffed at by the public, who variously christened his wilderess stranger as the Mowgli or Wolf Man, the latter appellation being applied for no apparent reason and in defiance of the fact that Mr. King described it as distinctly ape-like, not wolf-like. Yet now across the border strange creatures bearing stranger resemblance to Mr. King's discovery, have been seen, so it is said and Jorgi Totsgi, noted Indian scholar, says it is well known among his people that these weird beings are believed to hail from the wilds of Vancouver Island.  
It seems to have been in the winter of 1904—05 that Mr. King met with his experience. Later the creature was reported to have been sighted by other workers in the wilds, and on Jan. 1, 1906, The Colonist quoted the original discoverer thus:  
"The theory seems to me to be the only way to account for the origin of the strange being I saw a little more than a year ago," said Mr. King (referring to a report that the creature of the woods was the descendant of a gorilla cast ashore on Vancouver Island by shipwreck).  
"For even if a man lived in a wild state from birth he could not have assumed the ape-like attributes possessed by this creature which I saw. I came up by accident and was only about 25 feet away when it caught sight of me. Just below the creature you like to call it, was squatted down like a monkey beside a little stream. It was washing a kind of wild onion that we prospectors sometimes eat when we run short of provisions. I thought it was a bear, but when it heard me and startled when I brought my rifle to my shoulder, for it was the strangest sight I ever expressed eyes on."  
"Imagine being in the depths of a lonely forest and meeting an animal in the shape of a man, standing over six feet high and covered all over with long coarse black hair which, on some portions of the body was a foot long. The forehead was low and retreating, and its small eyes glared at me in surprise for a moment. Just below the eyes the hair on the face of the creature was short, but everywhere else it was long and shiny, and on the hand the hair hung down below the finger ends. The being stood quite straight for a moment in surprise and seemed to me to weigh about 240 pounds.  
"If it had taken one step towards me I would have put a bullet through it, for I had it covered with my rifle. But after glaring at me for a moment it uttered a cry a half human kind of grunt—and grasping a branch nearby, hoisted itself up the bank of the creek and ran away through the underbrush, slightly bending at it did so, with the speed of a startled deer.  
"I examined the creature's footprints afterward. Its feet were short and very broad. I noticed the heel came back almost to a point like that of a gorilla. The armful of wild onions that it had been cleaning at the little stream was as nicely done up as if a human being had prepared them."  
The theory mentioned by Mr. King was that the wild thing was of shipwreck origin. The explanation had been advanced that about 28 years before a gorilla, part of the cargo of a vessel wrecked on the coast, was the only survivor of the disaster. Its cargo had been washed off the deck by the waves and broken up in the surf. The ape managed to climb shore. Such of the crew of the vessel as reached the beach were said to have been slaughtered by the Indians. Subsequently, so the tale ran, a warship was sent up from Victoria to avenge the massacre. This apparently refers to the wreck of the British barque John Bright, lost in 1869 at Hospital, when the survivors were butchered by natives. Whether she carried a gorilla or not is not generally known. She was bound from Callao to Pudget Sound with a cargo of lumber.

**Fossilized Animals Expected To Reveal Geological History**

(United Press)  
PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—Further light on the geological history of the western part of the continent, as revealed in fossils of prehistoric animals, is expected to be obtained by an expedition of scientists, headed by Professor Chester Stock of the University of California department of paleontology, which set out from here recently to carry on investigations in the John Day Valley in eastern Oregon.  
The explorations are the result of the interest of Dr. John C. Merriam of the Carnegie Institute, who some years ago discovered the region following discoveries by Dr. Thomas Condon, famous Oregon geologist.  
Professor Stock was accompanied by E. J. Furlong, curator of the University of California museum, and by three students of geology. They expected to be joined later by R. W. Cheney of the Carnegie Institute, who intended to study plant fossils. The United States Geological Survey also is interested in the venture.  
Fossilized skeletons of animals of the Tertiary period will be sought in the John Day Valley, which geologists declare was once the bed of a vast inland sea covering eastern Oregon, Nevada, and extending to southern California.  
Discoveries heretofore made in the region have yielded fossilized remains of a wide variety of animals, including prehistoric horses, camels, rhinoceroses and saber-toothed tigers. Professor Stock hopes that further excavations will yield data whereby it will be possible to correlate the different animals zones and possibly establish the sequence in the forms of animal life which existed in America ages before human habitation.
