—The Schr "Three Bells", Captain Smith, bound for Miscou from Port Hastings came in Friday to Hilman's Wharf for supplies.



MADE MODEATOR BY PRESBYTERIANS

WINNIPEG, June 8.—The Rev. Andrew Browning Baird, M. A., D. D., who thirty-five years ago came to the west as a pioneer missionary of the Presbyterian church and who for almost thirty years has been identified with the Manitoba College, of which he is acting principal, was last night elected moderator of the General Assembly, thus receiving the highest honor which the denomination can bestow. Other nominations included the Rev. Dr. John Neill, of Toronto.

Dr. Baird, who will preside at all the meetings for the next ten days, was born in the village of Motherwell, Ont., in 1855. He was educated at Upper Canada College, the University of Toronto, where he graduated in 1887 (M. A., 1890), Knox College, Toronto (D. D., 1913), Edinburgh University (D. D.), and the University of Leipzig.

He was ordained in 1881 and went to Edmonton, where he was minister of the First Presbyterian Church until 1887. In the latter year he was transferred to Manitoba College and has remained in connection with the institution since that time.

Westminster Church, where all the meetings of the Assembly will be held, was completely filled when the opening service was begun. It was estimated that there were fully 500 delegates present, every presbytery in the church, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, being represented by ministers and laymen. The balance of the congregation was made up of representatives of the many Presbyterian churches in the city and of other religious organizations.

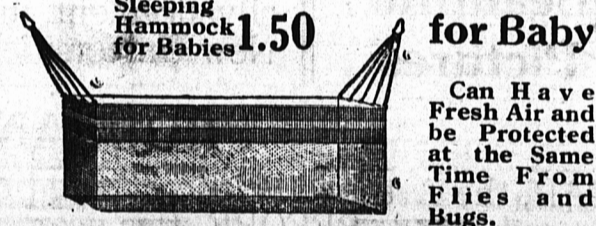
