STREET LIGHTS WERE DISCUSSED

At the Regular Meeting of the Council

And the Council Requested that They be Lit Earlier in the Evening—Other Matters for Consideration.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night, all present but Coun. Grant.

After reading minutes, bills were passed. Coun. Stewart questioned an account for bookbinding from Wm. Gillespie.

Coun. Moore had not at first intended taking any notice of these charges as they were beneath his notice, but—

Coun. Whear rose to a point of order. Such discussion would be endless. Coun. Moore continuing stating that the transaction was a perfectly square one.

Coun. Stewart moved that the bill be allowed to stand over but as there was no second the main motion carried, Coun. Stewart dissenting.

A communication from Fred H Barr, representing the Gurney-Tilder Co. Ltd. was read regarding heating of Market.

A communication re increase in wages for cleaning of building etc was read and an increase of \$2 per month in salary granted.

A petition from residents of Upper Prince street asking for macadamizing of that section of the city was read. Coun. Whear made a strong plea for the work and moved (seconded by Coun. Clarke, that the petition be granted.

After discussion by Couns Paton, Hooper and Moore and protests from Couns Lyons and Stewart to all the money going to War 15, the motion carried.

A communication was read from the Aide de Camp of the Governor General stating that portraits of their Excellencies were being sent as a souvenir of their visit to the city to be hung in the City Hall.

Mayor Warburton submitted a report of his attendance at the meeting of Canadian municipalities at Ottawa which was adopted.

Coun. Whear referred to the light at the lower end of Upper Prince which was frequently out. He spoke of other lights which were often out. It is too bad that such frequent complaints have to be made. The clerk should notify the company that the globes must be kept clean.

Couns. Hooper, Moore, Stewart and others spoke of other lights which were out and Coun. Moore approved of the suggestion that a special man be appointed to see if the lights are out.

Coun. Paton spoke of a drain that ran through Patk. Cullen's garden on East Kent Street near the Railway. It would cost \$75 to remedy this. He moved the work be done. Carried.

Coun. Whear directed the attention of

the Surveyor to another drain near the Dominion Packing Co., and Coun. Lyons mentioned the matter of the drain of John Bolger on Water Street.

Coun. Hooper referred to the connection of Douglas and Highland Avenue through the Desbrisay property and moved that the Recorder prepare the deed.

The Marshall was instructed to ask the policemen to pay particular attention to lights out in the outlying parts. It was also the desire of the council that the lights be on at dark—much earlier than at present.

After further discussion as to the many street lights-out and their being reported by the city the council adjourned.

F. H. CLERGUE, THE CANADIAN MORGAN, HIS RISE AND FALL.

The Man Who Built the Great Soo Works, Where a Tie-up Has Taken Place—He's Been a Promoter Since You h, But He Never Seemed to Make Money Out of His Schemes.

In these days of trouble in Wall street the calcium light of public attention has been directed to the affairs of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company, the collapse of which has wrought havoc in some instances financial ruin throughout New England, Pennsylvania and Canada. It was a vast industrial empire of the north which Francis H Clergue started out to create. The scheme which he evolved from his fertile brain exceeded in extent that which Andrew Carnegie lived a lifetime to produce and then succeeded in bringing into existence only a small part of Mr. Clergue's dream of industrial conquest. He had in view the development of a manufacturing world which would have done credit to the writers of glittering prospectuses when the South Sea enterprises were floated in London more than a century and a half ago. It is safe to say that neither Father Marquette nor the Company of One Hundred Associates, who traveled and trapped and made discoveries in the spots which Mr. Clergue selected as his favored ones, had dreams of industrial empire such as that to which tried and experienced financiers of New York, Philadelphia and Toronto listened to and grew enthusiastic.

A THOUSAND CITIES IN ONE. At the Soo, where the frigid waters of Lake Superior dip into the connecting link with Lake Huron, Mr. Clergue planned a Pittsburgh, a Niagara and a thousand cities of New England rolled into one. There was a water power canal which would furnish as much power as that of Niagara. Steel and iron plants were to
