Conny Mack Picks Bill Johnson as Seasons Rookie

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 9—(AP)—Conny Mack the great dissembler disagrees with the majority of fans, players and experts that Detroit's "Doc" Wakefield is the number one American League rookie of the year. Mack says he likes the Yankees' Bill Johnson.

"I follow Johnson is quite a player," says Philadelphia Athletics' Mack. "He is a 25-year-old manager."

"On looking at the runs-batted-in column, you will notice that Wakefield's name is not among the leaders. But right in third position Johnson's name appears."

"Very few young infielders have come up in their first year and played the same power to drive in runs as has Johnson. I'm not sure, but I'd be willing to say his production as many runs in his first season as any third baseman in the league contributed in his first season."

A check showed that Ken Keltner of Cleveland produced 113 in his first year, 1938, to lead the first year records of the current crop. Johnson's record stood at 87 before today's game and he had about 25 games left to play. His batting average was .295.

"Wakefield," says Conny, "is a good outfielder and has showed he can hit, but I wouldn't go so far as some in saying he's well on his way to becoming a second Ted Williams. Pitchers can fool Wakefield, but they had a difficult time trying to outsmart Williams, and they don't fool Johnson to any extent. You can't outsmart him."

Servicemen to "See" This Year's World Series

CHICAGO, Sept. 9 — (AP) — Soldiers all over the world are going to see baseball's world series this year.

They will see it in a two reel, 22 minute sound film that will be distributed to all foreign bases, Lew Fonseca, promotional director of the American league and producer of its annual motion pictures, said today.

Filming the 1943 series — a cinch to be a rematch of New York's Yankees and the champion St. Louis Cardinals — will be undertaken by the American League in co-operation with the War and Navy Departments and two sponsors, Fonseca said.

The announcement came as an overseas tour by an all-star major league squad is also being considered.

Sport Shorts From Britain

LONDON, Sept. 6—(CP)—Britain's booming bloodstock market is continuing its upward trend and owners and breeders, eyes turned to post war racing and export trade, competed keenly at the first Newmarket Sales of the year.

The National Stud, property of the British taxpayers, had the most successful and quickest public sale of its venerable history when four yearlings, in and out of the auction ring in nine minutes brought an aggregate of \$63,000. This was a record average for the stud.

The two-day sale's top price of \$28,975 was paid for a chestnut filly by the Derby winner, out of Carotto. J.E. Ferguson, owner of a London plastic firm who dabbles in racing stock, was the purchaser.

The Hon. Catherine Macdonald-Buchanan stepped beside the Hon. Dorothy Page and Mrs. Betty Livingston as an outstanding turf figure by purchasing Lord Harewood's Newmarket Egerton estate that includes racing stables and a stud farm. The purchase emphasized her intentions to allow her turf enthusiasm to have full scope after the war.

Daughter of Lord Woolvington, under whose will she inherited around \$13,000,000, Mrs. Macdonald-Buchanan has been in racing for several years and won the Derby with Owen Tudor in 1941.

Farmer and souvenir hunters replaced jockeys and bookmakers on the old Lincolnshire Steeplechase course at Brookley, North Lincolnshire, when all equipment of the track, which had carried on for more than a century, went under the hammer. The course itself has been plowed up in keeping with the country's wartime program of utilizing all available land for crop-growing.

A handbill, used to announce upcoming races, was purchased by a souvenir hunter for \$23 and an amateur rider bought the number board for \$55.

Auctioneer Ronald Davy said at the sale's opening that "we hope to get going again after the war when we have put paid to Hitler's account."
