## FINANCIAL NEWS BRIEFS

(Received over Piffle Id and Co's Private Wire)

French Elections—Paris—Virtually complete returns today showed Popular Front as a whole had lost a net of 80 seats out of the total 3,392 to be elected but they held their majorities generally in the provinces.

Liverpool wheat opened unchanged to 1-8d higher. At 12.30 p. m. 3-8d to 7-8d higher.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 11—**Increases averaging approximately \$100 for its 1938 line of cars announced by Chrysler Corporation. A cautious attitude toward steel buying is delaying the anticipated fall revival, says Magazine Steel. Although automotive industry has rounded the corner and bookings from that source show definite improvement, volume is less than expected. Other consumers except farm implement and household equipment manufacturers are tending to reduce inventories and are buying on hand to mouth basis. Steel works operations last week edged 9 points to 66 per cent. Bridgeport Machine Co. nine months ended Sept. 30, 1937, profit \$586,452 after depletion, interest, etc. but before income taxes against \$349,581 in first nine months 1936.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 11—**The French elections yesterday would indicate that the present party in power will continue. It was announced on Saturday in Washington that President Roosevelt will give another of his fireside chats tomorrow night. The subject to be discussed was not made public. The London market was steady this morning. Amsterdam was reactionary and American stocks were about the same as the close in New York on Saturday. On the whole news this morning is better than it has been and we believe the market might do better today. However, we would take a look at the opening and see how well any additional selling will be taken.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 11—U. S. Government crop report at 3 p. m. U. S. Supreme Court meets at noon. Counting on steadily increasing surplus of cash revenues over cash expenditures U. S. Treasury believes that unless something unforeseen develops it has done its last cash borrowing in bond market and hereafter will leave that market entirely to corporate issues it is learned in Washington. Treasury is seeking to hold down its drafts on short term and medium term capital markets where the remainder of its cash borrowings probably is to be done. In line with this policy Treasury will hold December financing operation under \$1,000,000,000 and may endeavour to keep in neighborhood of \$750,000,000. New passenger sales in U. S. in September estimated at 220,000 units by B. L. Polk and Co. against 300,000 seven sales reporting in August and 208,978 in entire United States in September 1936.**

Bank of France has fixed the gold price at 33,689 francs per kilo against 33,695 on Friday.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 11—Electric output of 19 major utility systems during week ended October 2 recorded changes ranging from a**

decrease of 2 per cent to an increase of 12.2 per cent compared with similar 1936 period. In week ended Sept. 25 electric output of these same companies registered changes ranging from decline of 1.2 per cent to advance of 12.3 per cent contrasted with 1936. At the opening of the Paris bourse international issues were very weak with domestic bonds and stocks strong in an active market. The reversal in the tendency in foreign exchanges and on the bourse was attributed to the Swiss control and yesterday's elections. Authorities are not expected to yield to the temptation to allow the franc to appreciate but rather will replenish resources by buying sterling at around 150. In the Paris foreign exchange market sterling was quoted at 149.28 and dollars 30.13 with control buying throughout. Premier on forward sterling were at 2.25 and 2.5 centimes for one and three months.

## Roster of Rhodes Sch olars Represents Can ada From Coast to Coast



One of the most coveted of all honors open to young men is the Rhodes scholarship, awarded not merely for academic prowess, but for ability in sport and for character—qualities going to make up the "all-round man." Ten Rhodes scholars, selected from right across Canada, leave this week to take up residence in Oxford University, England, there to vindicate the high confidence placed in them. John Kenneth Macalister (1) is one of Ontario's contributions. He is 23, graduate of the University of Toronto, and went to school in Guelph. Ontario's other son is John Goudie (2) of Kingston, who is not 22 yet, and graduated from Queen's University. Quebec sends Roger Gaudry (4) who is 23 and a graduate of Laval University. Another Quebecer is John Snyder Hodgson (2). McGill graduates though only half-way through his 21st year. Henry Davis Hicks (6) is a Maritimer, graduate of Dalhousie University. Nova Scotia, and 22 years old. From New Brunswick there is William Donald Churchill Duffie (5) of St. John, Graduate of St. Joseph's University and of the University of New Brunswick law school. He is 22. Edmund David Fulton (7) is 21, graduated from the University of British Columbia, and represents that province. Graduate of the University of Manitoba is Hart Duncan Clark (8), who is 23. The remaining two Rhodes scholars are John Charles Garrett, 24, graduate of the University of Alberta, and Ian Walsh, 21, University of Saskatchewan graduate. Rhodes scholars are selected from the Empire, the United States and Germany. The scholarship may be held for three years. It amounts to approximately \$2,000 a year. A candidate in Canada must be a British subject, unmarried and must have passed his nineteenth but not his twenty-fifth birthday on Oct. 1 of the year he is elected. Candidates for 1938 may apply for the province in which they reside or in which they have received at least two years of their college education, applying to the provincial selection committee not later than Nov. 10.

## REARMAMENT APPROVED BY LABOR PARTY

Pacifist Wing of Party Rebuked As Resolution Is Adopted Unanimously.

BOURNEMOUTH, Hampshire Oct. 11—(CP Cable)—In a stormy session, the Labor Party today placed its final seal of approval on rearmament after a spokesman for the Party Executive had delivered a sharp rebuke to the pacifist wing of the party. By a vote of 2,169,000 to 262,000 the Conference rejected a motion by George Lansbury to refer back to the Executive the report on foreign policy of the National Council of Labor and then approved the report without division. After Mr. Lansbury, an uncompromising advocate of complete disarmament, had declared he could not support war in any circumstances, James Walker, M. P., for 25 years organizer for the Iron and Steel Trades Association directed a stinging attack at the Lansbury group on behalf of the Party's National Executive.

### Scores Lansbury

"I cannot understand," Mr. Walker declared, "the kind of philosophy which goes to Mussolini for afternoon tea and discussions—to the man who murdered Matteotti—or goes to Hitler—the man who imprisoned and assassinated Husemann—and then expects these men are going to do anything in the way of bringing peace to this world."

He was referring to Mr. Lansbury's recent peace talks with Premier Mussolini and Chancellor Hitler in Rome and Berlin. Giacomo Matteotti was an Italian Socialist, murdered in Rome in 1924, allegedly at the instigation of Mussolini. Friedrich Husemann, president of the German Federation of Miners, was shot while attempting to escape from a German concentration camp two years ago.

Ernest Bevin, supporting rearmament on behalf of the International Trades Union movement, declared that "with our movements wiped out in Germany and Italy and our friends perishing in concentration camps, we have had to say that if you are going to reply to our hand of friendship with a bomb, we are not going to leave ourselves defenceless."

The conference carried a resolution instructing the executive to launch a national campaign to compel the Government to abandon the Spanish Non-Intervention Agreement, "which allows the Fascist rebels to receive help while imposing sanctions on the Spanish Government" and to "restore to the democratically elected constitutional government of Spain its rights under international law to purchase arms and maintain its authority."

The resolution, moved by Sir Charles Trevelyan, was adopted unanimously. After being closed for eight months for work necessitated by the Coronation, Westminster Abbey is being reopened for public services.

## That Body of Yours

TRUE AND FALSE ANGINA PECTORIS

The pain generally starts in the region of the heart, up the left side of the chest and often down the left arm. The patient stops still whenever he stands perfectly erect or bends his body backward, raises his chin, supports himself with one hand, and places the other over his heart. The pain usually lasts but a few seconds.

I am describing the symptoms of an ordinary case of angina pectoris or breast pang as it is often called. Most cases occur during effort and are believed due to the muscular walls of the aorta—the large blood vessel into which the heart pumps the blood to be sent all over the body—having lost some of their elasticity. Naturally therefore when an individual gets a pain in the region of the heart or breast bone he is apt to consider it true angina and become alarmed.

However, Dr. G. Bourne, in the British Medical Journal, points out that there are a great many cases of false angina pectoris, which he calls angina innocens—or innocent angina. This pain is not due to any heart condition and is likely to gradually improve instead of becoming worse.

Dr. Bourne described a study of a series of thirty-eight patients suffering from such pain who have been under investigation for the past eight years. Two important points were found from questioning these patients: (a) The large percentage who has suffered from tonsillitis and rheumatic conditions, and (b) the large percentage also who were of the nervous or neurotic type (always a little afraid they have or are threatened with various ailments).

In order that many who at times have a pain in the region of the heart—due to dyspepsia, nervousness, or infection in the body—the symptoms of true angina pectoris should be remembered.

If pain is complained of as occurring only during exertion—work at rest or at night, it may be taken that the patient is not suffering from angina innocens (false angina) but from angina to effort—true angina.

By remembering that true angina comes on with effort and false angina occurs even when at rest, much confusion and worry will be avoided.
